Five Judges and Six Members in Present Councils Also to Be Elected Tuesday

SIX TICKETS ON BALLOT

A mayor, eight county officers, seven magistrates and twenty-one members of the new council are to be chosen at the general election next Tuesday.

In addition there are to be elected one Judge of the Superior Court, one of Common Pleas No. 4, one of the Orphans Court and two of the Municipal Court.

Since the primary campaign, interest in the election has waned, many voters believing that the result of the primary was final.

Her mother served as interpreter, but since Virginia Louise's sixteen months have brought her to the threshold of speech.

"Virginia Louise, did you like the king?" she was asked. Turning her big blue eyes which King Albert so aptly called "beautiful" upon her mother, she seemed to implore aid.

"Say, 'yes,' Virginia," said Mrs. Gilman, coming to her infant's aid.

Virginia Louise answered with a snice bob of her head.

"What did he look like," her interviewers asked.

"Me-ah, me-ah," was her reply, which is Virginia's answer to the question, "How does the pussy cat go?"

"But surely, the king didn't look like a pussy cat," cried Mrs. Gilman, horror-stricken. "Look," she continued, showing her daughter pictures of a meowgerie and saying, "This is a pussy cat."

Virginia responded by looking at the picture dubiously.

On the next page was a picture of a boy shepherd with the sheep and dog.

She immediately pounced upon it, crying, "Dadda, dadda."

"Yes," said Mrs. Gilman, "that looks like 'dadda.'"

"But what did the king look like, Virginia Louise," asked the interviewer.

"Dadda, dadda," came the immediate response.

Virginia Louise is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Gilman, of 13 Marlborough road, Overbrook.

"Madda" is assistant to M. C. Brush, president of the American International Shipbuilding Corporation.

Immediately following the launching of the Cantigny, as the king and his party were preparing to leave the island, Mr. Brush carried Virginia Louise to the king's motorcar and said:

"Your majesty, permit me to present to you Mr. Gilman's daughter, Virginia Louise."

He then handed her to her father, who held her close to the king.

King Albert responded to the introduction by exclaiming:

"What a wonderful baby; what beautiful big blue eyes!"
