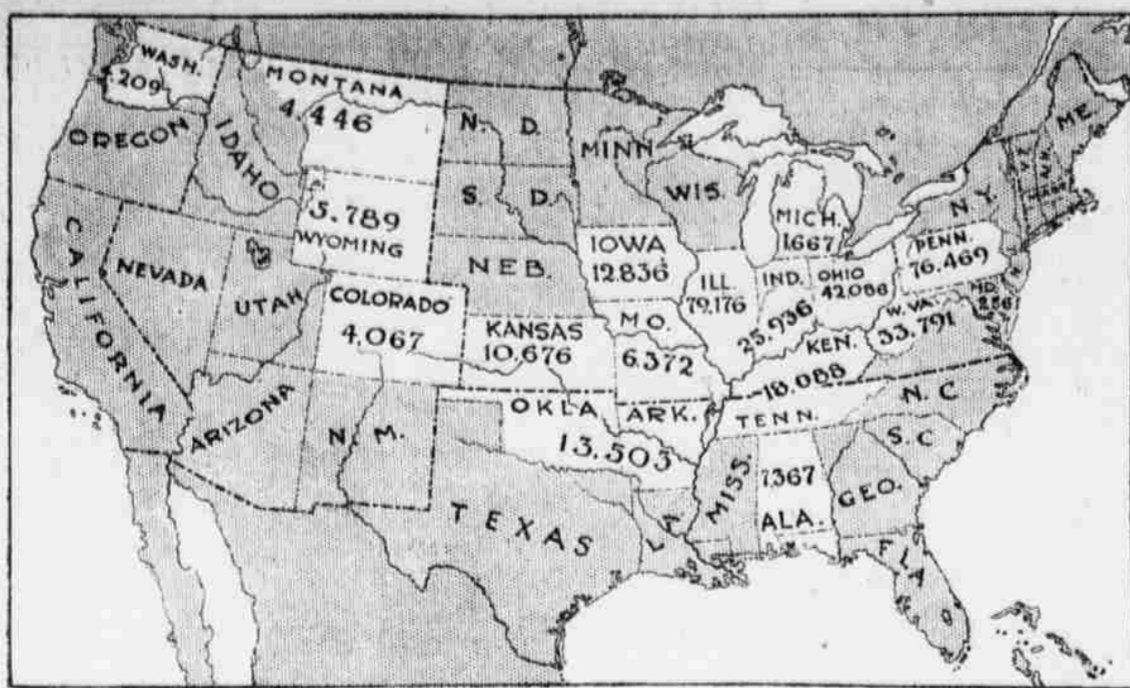


SOFT-COAL DISTRICTS AFFECTED BY STRIKE

COAL MINERS DESERTED 42,000 Strike in Western Pennsylvania—80,000 Workmen Out in Illinois NO DISORDERS REPORTED

By the Associated Press Pittsburgh, Nov. 1.—Approximately 42,000 miners in the Pittsburgh district went on strike today, according to figures of District No. 5 of the mine workers. The number represents virtually 100 per cent of the coal production of western Pennsylvania.

Columbus, O., Nov. 1.—(By A. P.)—Unofficial information received here early today indicates that virtually all of Ohio's 10,000 soft-coal miners are on strike. The number represents virtually 100 per cent of the coal production of western Pennsylvania.

Madisonville, Ky., Nov. 1.—Affected for the first time in ten years by a strike of large magnitude, the coal miners here today are in the grasp of a nation-wide strike of soft coal miners.

Paducah, Ky., Nov. 1.—(By A. P.)—Reports from western Kentucky mining districts indicate almost an entire force of miners reported this morning at work in Webster, Christian and Hancock counties. Today is payday, and it is pointed out that the majority of miners would report whether intending to strike later or not.

Knoxville, Tenn., Nov. 1.—(By A. P.)—Additional companies of federal troops are en route here today to reinforce 500 regulars already here for possible duty in the region. Union officials claimed 15,000 men would answer the call for a walkout in this district. This statement was vigorously challenged by the operators.

Charleston, W. V., Nov. 1.—(By A. P.)—Reports received at the headquarters of District No. 17, United Mine Workers of America, today indicate that approximately 32,500 miners had answered the strike call in West Virginia. With only two exceptions, where organized miners are working under recent contracts, and with the exception of the men left at the mines to protect the property, union officials declared that the response to the call was 100 per cent.

Cumberland, Md., Nov. 1.—(By A. P.)—When from 8,000 to 10,000 miners in the two fields here today are on strike, the government authorities do not contemplate that any attempts at violation of the court order will be made, but are taking no chances in the matter.

Bay City, Mich., Nov. 1.—(By A. P.)—Not a pound of coal is being produced in Michigan coal mines today according to reports of District No. 24 United Mine Workers of America, they added, went out yesterday to remain out until they have won this strike. "Every mine in the district is closed," said President William Stevenson, of the Michigan district.
