DEFEATS TILDEN, TIGERS PREPARING FOR HARVARD TILT

Princeton Getting Ready to Hurl Full Strength Against Crimson and Yale—West Virginians Play Remarkable Football in Defeating Coach Roper's Eleven

By SPICK HALL. PRINCETON was beaten Saturday afternoon by the University of West Virginia 25 to 0. It might reasonably be expected that this would cause a dense mass of gloom to hang over the classic, icy-bound hills of Old Nassau. But it didn't. The gloom was there all right but it was there before the game, as well as after. It was natural gloom caused by the weeping elements that had no consideration whatsoever for the football game and that poured a relentless rain on the playing field throughout the entire massacre.

Of course, the Princeton fans are not rejoicing over their humiliating defeat, but they are not discouraged. And as a matter of fact there is no reason why they should be discouraged. They went into the game against West Virginia minus the services of Keck, their best tackle; Trimble, the man around whom the entire Princeton offense revolves; Louis, their center; two backfield men, who are much better than De Stefano, and Murrey, who played in the Mountaineers' tragedy.

Forget Easily. The student body, coaches, players, alumni and friends of Princeton are all and friendly. They have virtually forgotten that the Orange and Black has been defeated on successive Saturdays by Colgate and West Virginia. They are looking to the Harvard and Yale games, before Saturday's game. Coach Roper said that the Princeton offense is the West Virginia game, he was not going to jeopardize his chances for his big games by putting in his best material.

It isn't that I mind playing my best men against West Virginia," said Roper, "for if they were all right I would do it in the best condition and I don't propose to have them banged up in a game that means nothing to us when they can be so valuable against Harvard and Yale."

Few people realize that Princeton, Yale and Harvard play all of their football with the idea of beating only the other two in the triangle. If, for example, Yale should beat Harvard and Princeton by decisive scores the members of the Blue eleven would not claim the victory as the winners of the world. It is true that a lot of football writers, notably those of New York City try to impose the best one of the so-called Big Three on the public as champions.

But the winners themselves do not make any such claim. They simply play their football as if they were playing it for themselves. They are not out for titles and they do not claim any and it is grossly unfair to the players and the institution that they make certain claims when the first they see of these claims is in a newspaper.

Preparing for Harvard. Hearing this in mind it is not hard to see why Princeton takes her defeat from West Virginia so lightly. The Tigers are preparing for the Harvard game next Saturday, and if they can win that the past is not only forgotten but is put into the "don't care" column. This year the Princeton team has had a few signal drills to prepare them for the Crimson battle.

And this tilt with Harvard is going to be a battle. Just as Princeton is like a different team against Colgate from the one that played Rochester, so the Tigers' appearance next Saturday will differ from that of the West Virginia game. Harvard may and probably will win, but it will be a battle and one to be remembered.

SIX WINS IN ROW FOR BERWYN HIGH

Tredyffrin-Easttown's Lightweight Eleven Scores Total of 135 Points to 9

PAUL TEAMER IS COACH. By PAUL PREP. As in past seasons, football again is holding sway—very much in the line—light—up around Berwyn, Chester county, Pa., on the Main Line. Speed, rather than weight, is giving the Tredyffrin-Easttown High School, of Berwyn, another winning eleven. Six consecutive victories have been scored by this team, under the tutelage of Paul Teamer, and an aggregate of 135 points to 9 has been tallied to date.

Tredyffrin-Easttown's representative by only four veterans, including Captain Harold Sorden, on the gridiron this season. The next was a Chester county team that boasted of a clean-cut victory, but the cherished hopes were rudely broken when Tredyffrin-Easttown closed the season with a final score of 16 to 0. Another hard game followed, that with the strong Byrn Athyn eleven, and the Berwyn squad, out for revenge on account of the one defeat last season, had its hopes realized by a victory, 27 to 0. Media High, having requested a return game after its defeat earlier in the season, again was taken into camp, this time by the lopsided score of 25 to 0, or a total of 54 to 0 for the two games. Last Friday Cheltenham High journeyed out to Berwyn and Coach Teamer's tigers scored another shut-out.

This week Tredyffrin-Easttown is scheduled with Downingtown High, which will be another county game, and the following Friday, the 14th, the big game of the Main Line, when Harford is scheduled at Berwyn, when Harford High will be played. This team has been going at a fast clip. The victory will lay claim to the Main Line scholastic championship. The Chester county big game will be the Thanksgiving Day, when the West Chester High team appears on the Berwyn gridiron. This game always attracts several thousand followers of both schools, and it is a big holiday attraction. Last season Tredyffrin-Easttown went into the county seat at West Chester and, after West Chester kicked a field goal, jumped right in and ran the opposition off the field with a total of 33 points. Both teams are well rated this season.

Tredyffrin-Easttown footballers have been showing considerable speed, and Quarterback Trainer has a fine system in running off plays. Harvey Terry has been the pivotal star in playing around football. He calls a number of intricate plays that are pulled. Terry invariably hits the line for good gains, and also shows up well in end runs. His pronounced playing ability and "do or die" spirit has been injected into the entire team, which may account largely for the success attained by the squad from this school that marks the hills overlooking the historic Valley Forge, with a possibility that the spirit and shades of the immortal George Washington still remains active.
