

### MOORE AND PARTY TO LEAVE TONIGHT

Mayor-Elect Will Head Philadelphia Delegation of Waterways Boosters

### TO PRESIDE AT CONVENTION

Mayor-elect Moore will head a party of 118 waterway boosters who will sail on the steamship Howard for Charleston, S. C., tonight, where Mr. Moore will preside over the twelfth annual convention of the Atlantic Seaboard Waterways Association. The convention will be in session from November 10 to November 13. Congressman Moore is president of the association.

He sails for Charleston carrying with him the hopes and fears of those who are candidates for cabinet and other appointments under the incoming administration. Only two of those who have been mentioned for cabinet posts will be in the Philadelphia delegation. They are William E. Bernard, of the Maritime Exchange, and Director of Wharves, Docks and Ferries, Webster. Mr. Bernard is a candidate for director of wharves, docks and ferries, the post now held by Mr. Webster.

Mr. Walsh, superintendent of public works for the state of New York; Emil P. Albrecht, president of the Philadelphia Bourse, and Congressman Whaley, of South Carolina.

### P. O. S. OF A. HAILS COOLIDGE VICTORY

Committee Here Telegraphs Congratulations to Massachusetts Governor

### CALLED BLOW AT RADICALS

The Patriotic Order Sons of America, through its new national committee, sent Governor Coolidge a telegram of congratulation on his victory Tuesday. The message, sent from national camp headquarters, 1017 North Broad street, follows:

"On behalf of an order representing an ocean to ocean and border to border membership, consisting of 100 per cent Americans, we congratulate you on your great victory for American ideals. Gabriel H. Moyer, national president of the organization, declared the victory of Governor Coolidge was a victory for Americanism as against radicalism.

"The issue was clear," said Mr. Moyer. "It was patriotism, 100 per cent Americanism, versus the forces which opposed law and order. And the majority of Governor Coolidge was a splendid registration of the American ideals of the people of Massachusetts."

He pointed out that probably 75 per cent of the members of the Patriotic Order Sons of America were laboring men, and estimated that about 50 per cent were union members.

"We stand for the American ideals exemplified by Washington and our forefathers who founded this country," declared Mr. Moyer. "We have been and always will be supporters of law and order as against those who are advocating violence and radicalism."

"The success of Governor Coolidge in Massachusetts inspires us to carry the work of our organization with special zest into that field," he declared. "We want to enlist patriotic American born men in our opposition to the forces of disorder."

### 1000 WIDOWS NEED AID

There are at least 1000 widows in Philadelphia who are too poor to send their children to school. This statement was made yesterday by Henry J. Gideon, director of the Bureau of Compulsory Education, in commenting on the increasing number of children absent from school without leave.

"Our attendance officers can use pressure if necessary to secure school attendance, but it is not within the province of the department to clothe children for school," said Mr. Gideon. He said that the situation was unusually serious this year because charitable organizations are short of funds.
