Nov. 5. -- (delayed.)---General Diedriche has resigned as commander of the western armics of the Omsk govern-ment and was succeeded by General Sakharoff, former commander of the third army. The resignation was the result of lack of accord with Admiral Kolchak over the question of trans-ferring the capital enstward. Evacuation of Omsk by civilian in-stitutions, hospitals, government offices and civilians continues in perfect order. There is a continuous stream of carts and trucks loaded with all conceivable articles on the way to the station but there is no undue haste and no panic. 
