Dr. Garber Plans for Seventieth Annual Meeting of State Organization

Dr. John P. Garber, superintendent of schools, and Philadelphia committee members, are busy making final plans for the seventieth annual meeting of the Pennsylvania State Educational Association, which will be held here December 29 to January 1.

Dr. Garber heads the committee on local arrangements, with the following assistants: as well-known educators, W. E. Blomberg, superintendent of schools, Philadelphia; Louis Neuhart, hotel accommodations; George Wheeler, meeting places; E. W. Parson, music; William A. Mason, exhibits; Miss Ada Livengood, pedagogical libraries and visualized situation and exhibits; William C. Ash, vocational exhibits; William A. Stecher, physical education exhibits and demonstrations; Helmut Walter, places of historical interest in Philadelphia.

The Hotel Adelphi will be headquarters, but most of the sessions will be held in Central High School Auditorium. Among the prominent speakers on the program are: Governor Sproul, Charles H. Judd, University of Chicago; M. L. Burton, president of the University of Minnesota; Thomas H. Briggs and William H. Kilpatrick, Columbia University; Thomas F. McGuire, superintendent of public instruction, Pennsylvania; M. P. Hilliges, commissioner of education, Vermont; and Harold W. Foght, president Northern Normal and Industrial School, Aberdeen, S. D.

LEGION POST HERE ASSAILS RADICALS

Adopts Resolution Denouncing Abuse of Freedom Accorded Citizens of Nation

MEMBERSHIP IS DOUBLED

Unwarranted abuse by radical and "Reds" in the United States of the freedom accorded citizens of this country was denounced last night by the American Legion at its meeting in the Midway Club auditorium, Eighteenth and Cherry streets.

The resolution was presented by A. W. Kinghouse, the secretary, and was adopted by unanimous vote of the post. It reads as follows:

"Whereas, there has been throughout the United States on the part of radicals, Bolsheviks, and so-called 'Reds' an unwarranted abuse of the freedom accorded persons in this country; and

Whereas, these abuses threaten the very backbone of our government and strike at the keystone of liberty, and whereas, the American Legion stands firmly pledged to the maintenance of law and order;

Resolved, That Post No. 465 of the American Legion commends the Federal government in its present course to support inalienable rights and further;

Resolved, That the post offers to provide volunteer assistance, in connection with the investigation of anti-American activities in Philadelphia county, if the established Federal agencies happen at any time to be short-handed;

In negative command you beg a man to resist an impulse you, yourself, may be suggesting to him for the first time.

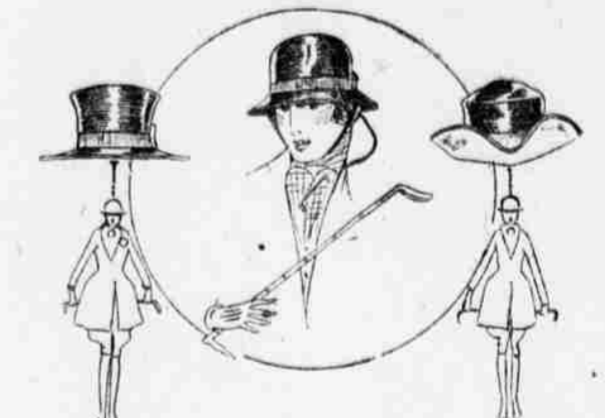
