MATZENAUER SCORES WITH THE ORCHESTRA

Artist Gives Great Demonstration of Her Artistry—Modern Italian Number Played

Miss Margaret Matzenauer, the soloist, bore off the honors of yesterday's concert of the Philadelphia Orchestra at the Academy of Music when she showed herself to be as great in concert work as in opera. The program arranged by Mr. Stokowski was a model one from every standpoint, comprising a number of highly diversified numbers, and all of interest.

The concert began with the Prometheus Overture of Beethoven and was followed by the Haydn G major symphony No. 15. Both these works are well known to concert goers and both were splendidly played. A Haydn symphony is always interesting for its clarity, grace and simplicity, as well as for its sheer musical beauty and for the fact that the later ones, of which this is one, contain the unmistakable germs of the modern symphony, minus its complexity and heavy orchestration. Mr. Stokowski played the symphony in one movement.

Madame Matzenauer then sang four songs: "Erer Lighter Grows My Slumber," of Brahms; the "Bride's Song," No. 1 and 2, of Schumann, and the "Erie Song," of Schubert, the four being orchestrated by Mr. Stokowski. The choice of the first two was perhaps not quite so happy as it might have been. The style of these compositions did not seem to suit Madame Matzenauer, and, so well as most others, although they were sung with great artistry. The accompaniments are exceedingly pianistic, and the orchestra was directed to translate into the idiom of the orchestra, in addition to which Mr. Stokowski has made the orchestration so highly colorful as to attract attention from the vocal part. In the third and fourth numbers of the group, the tender "Leave Me in His Arms," of Schumann, and the dramatic "Erking," of Schubert, Madame Matzenauer found more congenial media for her fine talents and both were exquisitely sung. The first with the greatest tenderness and delicacy and the "Erking" with intense dramatic fervor. Mr. Stokowski's orchestration of both these numbers was artistic, effective and, like the others, full of color.

It was in the concluding number of the concert that Miss Matzenauer secured her greatest ovation, and in so doing she received an ovation such as seldom given any artist by the ordinary concert audience at a symphony concert. Her performance of "The Twilight of the Gods" (Brundhilde's Immolation), and though a soprano part, she gave it in the original key. Her singing was superb, and she acted, the great work with a dramatic force rarely equalled even on the operatic stage. Her costume, of a soft, sceneric and costume. It was a remarkable piece of singing as well as of interpretation. Mr. Stokowski entered fully into the spirit of the music, and his handling of the orchestral accompaniment was sympathetic and virile.

The novelty of the program was a composition in the general form of a symphonic poem by Malipiero, an ultra-modern Italian composer. It was entitled "The Twilight of the Gods" and consisted of seven short movements, or "symphonic expressions" as they are termed, played without intermission.
