

RADICALS BEATEN AT FRENCH POLLS

Moderates Gain 46 Seats in Chamber of Deputies as Extremists Lose 16

NITTI WINNER IN ITALY

 Paris, Nov. 17.—Returns from Sunday's election for the chamber of deputies show the conservatives, nationalists and moderates far in the lead, those parties winning 191 seats in the 290 constituencies for which complete figures have been received.
 The extreme Socialists received a severe setback throughout the country and in general the Socialists suffered the defeat of many of their leaders. Pierre Renaudel, leader of the majority Socialists; Jean Longuet, leader of the minority Socialists; Henry Franklin-Bouillon, the radical Socialist chairman of the foreign relations committee, and Pierre Brizon were beaten. The returns show a gain of forty-six seats for the moderates and a loss of sixteen for the extremists.
 General Edouard de Castelnau and General L. E. deMaud'Huy, military governor of Metz, were elected, but General M. P. E. Sarrail, and General Pierre-Roques went down to defeat. Aristide Briand and Rene Viviani, both former premiers, were returned, but Prof. Paul Painlevé, also a former prime minister, was defeated.
 Paul Meunier, the radical Republican deputy, who was recently arrested charged with having had intelligence with the enemy, received Albert F. Lehan, former minister of blockade and the invaded regions, who was dismissed from his post by Premier Clemenceau because his name appeared on the same

list with that of Deputy Louis Marin, who cast his vote against the peace treaty, was elected, as was Marin.
 The list of Georges Mandel, Premier Clemenceau's chief confidential secretary, was first in the Bordeaux district. The whole list was elected. Captain André Tardieu, the present minister of blockade and the invaded regions, was victorious over Franklin Boulier in Seine-et-Oise.
 Rome, Nov. 17.—(By A. P.)—Judicials are that 119 ministerialists, twenty-seven members of the constitutional opposition, forty-five socialists, thirty-two radicals, twenty-one nationalists and fourteen republicans have been elected to the chamber of deputies.
 Extraordinary measures were adopted by the authorities to insure the safety of the elections. In Rome alone, 10,000 carabinieri and military police were engaged in this duty, in addition to the ordinary police.
 In the province of Potenza it was believed Premier Nitti was elected by a large majority. Despite strong opposition, Vittorio Orlando, and Antonio Salandra, both former premiers, also seemed to have been elected.
 Brussels, Nov. 17.—The latest reports from the elections in Belgium are that the Catholics have lost about fifteen seats and the Liberals seven seats to the Socialists.
 For the first time in the Belgian elections, "one-man-one vote" applied, and the results are eagerly awaited, as a definite change of policy seems almost certain.
 'PUSSYFOOT' MAY LOSE EYE
 Injury to Anti-Saloon Man More Serious Than at First Supposed
 London, Nov. 17.—(By A. P.)—The injury to the eye which William E. "Pussyfoot" Johnson, the American Anti-Saloon League organizer, received last week during a demonstration by students is proving more serious than at first thought. A second operation has been consulted and another operation has been performed.
 It is feared it may be necessary to extract the eye. His sight has been permanently impaired, it is said.

L'AMM. MILLO E' CON D'ANNUNZIO

Non Un Soldato Italiano Lascerà il Suo Includo nel Patto di Londra

 Fiume, 15 novembre.—(tribunale)—L'ammiraglio Millo, il comandante italiano delle forze di occupazione in Dalmazia, si è unito alla causa di D'Annunzio, giurando fedeltà al patto e dichiarando che non un soldato italiano lascerà il suo includo nel patto di Londra.
 L'ammiraglio Millo ha scritto all'On. Nitti informandolo della sua azione. L'On. Nitti ha risposto dicendo: "Io non sono sorpreso, alla fine, dell'ultima intesa di D'Annunzio. Ciò nonostante sono dolente della vostra azione."
 "E' stato annunciato che D'Annunzio occuperà tutta l'Istria, compresa anche in parte che l'On. Tittoni propose fosse compresa nello Stato indipendente."
 D'Annunzio è tornato in Fiume la scorsa notte, dopo la sua spedizione a Zara. Il suo arrivo diede occasione ad una grandiosa dimostrazione da parte della popolazione. La guarnigione di Zara rimase al comando di uno dei suoi ufficiali.
 Fiume, 16 novembre.—L'ultima gesta di Gabriele D'Annunzio ancora lo abbia fatto patriota dell'intera costa Dalmata. Egli ha assicurato l'adesione della sua parte dell'ammiraglio Millo, il

comandante italiano delle forze di occupazione in Dalmazia.
 D'Annunzio ha ora il comando continuo della linea dell'armistizio Austro-Italiano a nord di Fiume, nella regione nordionale fino a Ragusa, giunto a nord di Cattaro, coprendo tutti gli approcci sulla costa della Dalmazia. Quattro basi di guerra, compresa una dreadnought e quattro torpediniere, sono state aggiunte al comando navale di D'Annunzio, dando ad esso una formidabile forza per mantenere la presente situazione.
 Washington, D. C., 17 novembre.—Notizie giunte al Dipartimento di Stato recano che D'Annunzio, dopo aver dichiarato l'occupazione di Zara, sulla costa della Dalmazia, ha fatto ritorno in Fiume.
 Secondo dette notizie, D'Annunzio raggiunse Fiume nel pomeriggio di sabato e fu accolto da una grande dimostrazione da parte della popolazione. Si dice che egli abbia dichiarato i suoi scopi per l'occupazione di altri territori, compresa parte dell'Istria, la quale dovrà formare uno Stato indipendente per togliere l'Italia da ogni responsabilità verso gli Alleati.

NEW REVOLUTION IN AUSTRIA SEEN

Gleomy Forecasts Are Made by Speakers Celebrating Republic's First Anniversary

The Vienna Government, it is reported, is unable to maintain its power and the republic is likely to fall to pieces, several groups declaring for a union with Germany. It is asserted that the Austrian army will not attempt to prevent a new revolution as its officers have for some time been gradually replaced with Socialists.

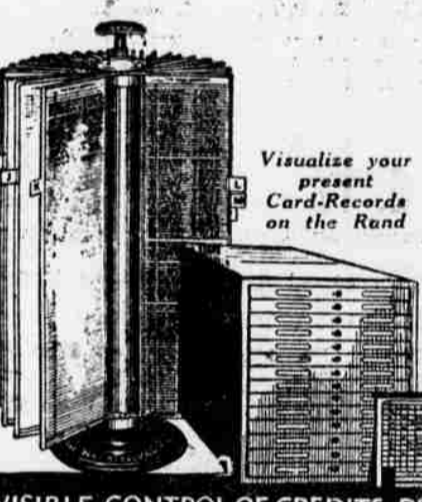
Speeches delivered Friday at celebrations of the anniversary of the founding of the Austrian republic, which were published after a twenty-four hour period in which no newspapers were issued, were decidedly gloomy and filled with forebodings as to the present and future economic conditions of the country. Here and there in the addresses a note favoring fusion with Germany was sounded. "German-Austrian workmen will never abate their demand for union with Germany," declared the burgo-master of Graz in his address.
