

HINDENBURG FACES WAR-BLAME GRILL

Ludendorff Also Called Before German Investigating Committee Today

BETHMANN IS STIRRED UP

 Berlin, Nov. 18.—Field Marshal von Hindenburg and General Ludendorff will attend today's meeting of the subcommittee of the national assembly investigating responsibility for the war. Military authorities have made comprehensive provisions to forestall any demonstrations, but the feeling in both the reactionary and the liberal camps is tense.

Interrogation of Dr. Karl Helfferich, former German vice chancellor, was completed yesterday. The penalty of three months' imprisonment was imposed for refusing to answer a question concerning the date of the peace treaty.

In a statement to the press, Doctor Helfferich admitted his refusal to answer the question submitted to him by Deputy Cohen, saying that Herr Cohen accepted money from M. Joffe, former Bolshevik ambassador to Germany, and that the official Wolf Bureau was declaring that Herr Cohen, in December, 1918, stated he had gladly accepted Russian money for bringing about a revolution in Germany, and had used it for that purpose.

An attempt made to place the blame for the war on the shoulders of the late Emperor William's speech in Alsace on the eve of the German proposal in December, 1916. This proposal in the discovery that the original order issued to the Wolf Bureau was destroyed during the occupancy of that organization's offices by the Spartacists last winter. The subcommittee desired to run down the responsibility for publishing the former emperor's declaration that Germany would be satisfied only with a "victorious peace."

Dr. Theobald von Bethmann-Hollweg, the then imperial chancellor, was planning a peace proposal. A controversy existed between Doctor Helfferich and Doctor Bethmann-Hollweg, the latter charging the German government with a failure to "cultivate" President Wilson, who, it was said, "saves a life" for individual leaders, but at that time might have been won over to the attempted peace action.

Count von Bernstorff, former German ambassador at Washington, declared the United States would have remained out of the war if President Wilson's mediation had been accepted, whereupon Von Bethmann-Hollweg retorted:

"Even the United States in the war did not make the Versailles peace necessary. I did not desire to participate in a battle for the soul of President Wilson, and in view of all elements entering into the situation, I could not conscientiously surrender Germany unconditionally to the President's proposed peace undertaking late in 1916 and early in 1917."

U. S. CAN'T DESTROY TREATY

Pact Will Be Enforced in Spite of Senate, Is Paris View
 Paris, Nov. 18.—(By A. P.)—Regardless of the American government's attitude the peace treaty of Versailles will be put into force, according to the prevalent view here today, following receipt of the report that President Wilson might withdraw the treaty from the United States Senate.

Whatever happens the feeling in French circles is that France cannot meet the German plenipotentiaries again, and French opinion is that Italy and Great Britain have a free feeling.

DESERTERS AID D'ANNUNZIO

Italian Government Unable to Check Defection in Army

IGNORANT MUST LEARN TO READ AND WRITE SOON OR GET LESS FOOD

Italian Government Unable to Check Defection in Army
 Rome, Nov. 18.—(By A. P.)—Desertions from the regular Italian army to the troops of Captain Gabriele D'Annunzio apparently cannot be prevented by the Italian Government. Recent events indicate that the regular forces will be loyal to the post if urgent demands.

Corps commanders guarding the assembly line along the Jugo-Slav frontier assert they will be unable to prevent a break in their forces. Should D'Annunzio make a move into Udine whole divisions will probably follow him.

Several merchant ships have arrived here during the last few days with food and supplies. This traffic is expected to be much augmented as a result of the support given D'Annunzio by the Italian navy.

PETROGRAD SOVIET COMPELS LITERACY

Ignorant Must Learn to Read and Write Soon or Get Less Food

KOLCHAK DRAFTS RAILMEN

 London, Nov. 18.—A radio dispatch from Moscow says the Petrograd Soviet has decreed that all illiterate persons must learn to read and write within six months, otherwise they will be deprived of their work and placed in a "food category."

The decree provides for deduction of two hours from the daily working period in order to permit attendance at school.

An official communication issued Friday at Moscow says:

"Ten of Kolchak's generals and more than 100 other officers are among the prisoners at Omsk, where the defeated remnants of Kolchak's army are being driven eastward. We occupied a number of positions twenty miles to the eastward and captured enormous quantities of stores. In the region of the Finnish gulf we have taken Ostrov and also have occupied the lower reaches of the Lena."

Representatives of Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Finland, Poland, Ukraine and White Russia have declared in favor of the formation of a political and military alliance to defend the independence of those nations, according to advices received here.

 Brussels, Nov. 18.—(By A. P.)—Directors and editors of the Germanophile newspaper *Pravda*, who were sentenced to death as traitors by the Belgian court a week ago, were publicly executed in effigy before the City Hall here this morning. The actors in the ceremony were four gardeners and an executioner, and the scene was witnessed by great crowds, cinema operators being busy recording the incident.

The death penalty exists in Belgium, but it is never carried out except in the case of persons in command of the arms at Omsk.

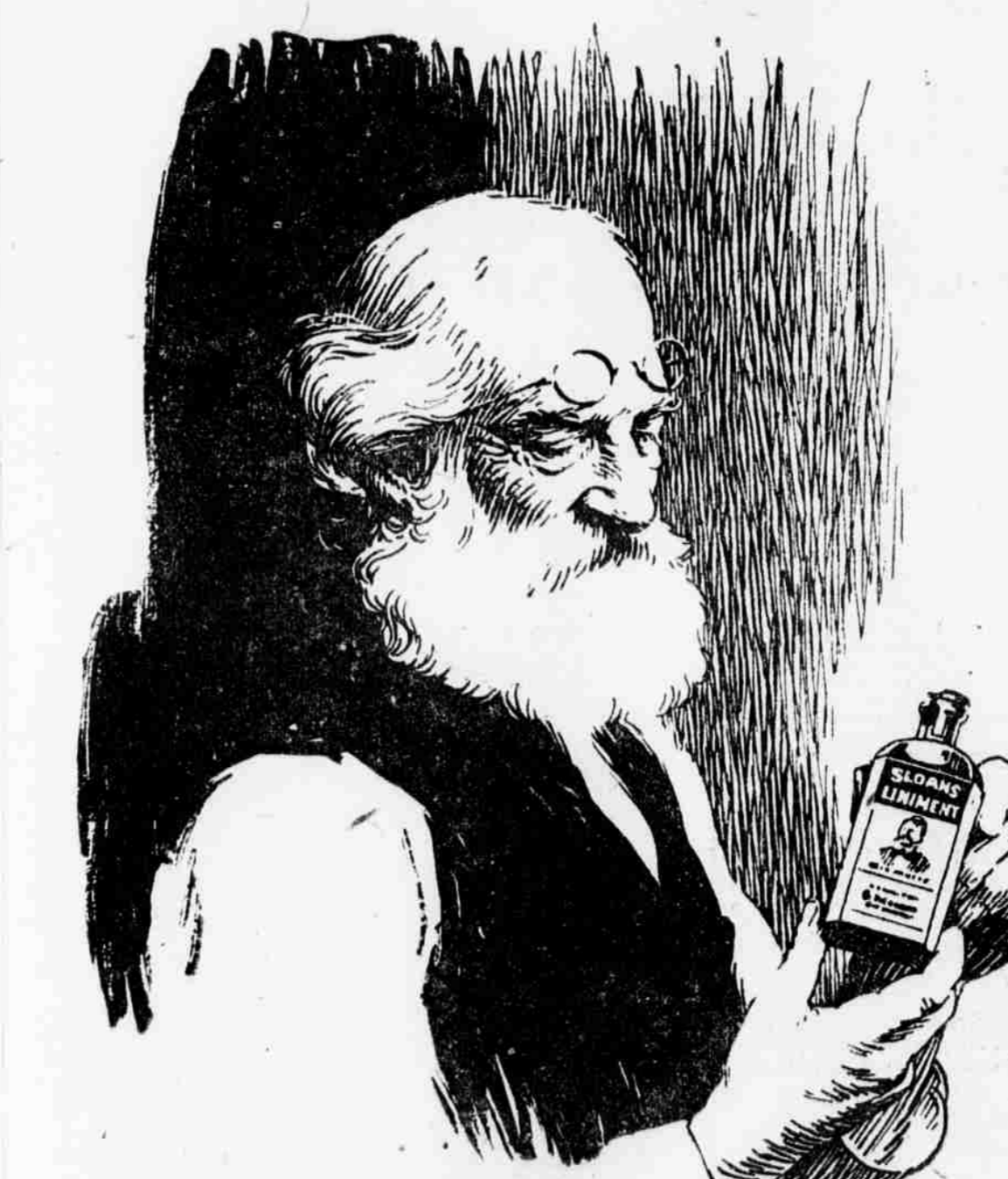
