

ENGLISH COLLEGES WELL FINANCED

No Embarrassment as Exists in the United States, British Professor Declares

IS VISITING PHILADELPHIA

"There is no such financial embarrassment among English universities and colleges as exists today in this country."

The authority for this statement is Prof. Arthur P. Newton, of the University College and King's College, London University, who is visiting Philadelphia.

"Over there," he said, "the universities are all drawing much more heavily on the financial aid of the state and also of the municipal government than they ever did before the war, and as a result they are not feeling the pinch which seems so evident in the United States."

"Another hint which I think American institutions might take," went on Doctor Newton, "is the use of private benevolences for the endowment of chairs and the formations of research departments and libraries, and not for buildings. Teachers' and lecturers' salaries in England have been raised to a degree commensurate with the increase in other lines."

Expects U. S. Soldiers to Return

According to Doctor Newton, a large proportion of the American soldiers who took courses at English universities during the war, of a technical nature, declared their intention of returning to take graduate work after they had obtained their bachelor's degrees at their own American alma maters. He expressed the hope that next year would see a great influx of American men into English colleges, especially in a course in which he is much interested, that of commerce.

"It is not," he explained, "anything in the nature of that given at the

"London commercial and trade leaders are working hard in hand with prominent educators, and the course in the London School of Commerce is one of the results. The degree is that of B. Com., and in time it is hoped to have a master's degree in the same subject. "It is aimed to give men both a practical and a theoretical knowledge of the world trade conditions. Large London manufacturing and commercial houses send their clerks and employees to take the three-year course which includes geography, history, a study of goods and raw products, some science and accounting. When they return to their respective firms, they are fitted to take an active and leading part in England's commercial enterprise."

The commerce course is a part of the University of London. It was first planned by the commercial committee of the university, of which Doctor Newton, who is a prominent historian, was a member.

Fears for American Industry

Doctor Newton expressed fears for the industrial and commercial situation in this country. Whereas he found England becoming rapidly more settled and

its affairs clearing, he was alarmed at the turbulent situation here.

"High rates of exchange will materially hurt the position of the United States in the world trade," he said, "because England can produce manufactured goods at such greatly reduced prices. And over there, too, we have definitely established collective bargaining, while you are still struggling among yourselves with no hope of settlement in view."

"Undigested foreigners" was the reason given by Doctor Newton for the troubled commercial and labor question here.

He refused to comment upon the league of nations.

Tests of Applicants Will Start Saturday in Five Schools

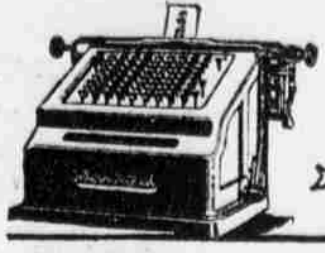
