Further Loan Contraction

New York, Nov. 29.—The reserve position of the clearing house institutions was materially improved this week. The weekly bank statement to-day showed an increase in excess reserve of \$34,065,690, bringing the actual surplus up to \$71,333,170. On the other hand, the contraction of only \$8,193,000 in loans hardly seemed to reflect the further heavy liquidation in the stock market. This, however, was possibly offset by the preparations for the December 1 settlements and disbursements. Net demand deposits fell off \$5,059,000.
