The food relief ships and the shipping facilities of which Mr. Hoover has charge will be placed at the disposal of the service committee and a certain portion of the European children's fund appropriated. In addition to these re-sources the American Friends are plan-ning to raise \$5,000,000 to perfect the organization and to purch as additional supplies.




