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LONDON STOCK MARKET

Greater Confidence Prevails on Exchange—Gilt-Edged Section Hard
London, Dec. 11.—A more confident feeling prevailed on the stock exchange today and, although business remained quiet, the markets generally were steady.

Bank of England Statement
London, Dec. 11.—The weekly statement of the Bank of England shows the following changes: Total reserve decreased £50,000, circulation increased £40,000, bullion decreased £130,000, other securities decreased £1,735,000, public deposits decreased £20,000, other deposits decreased £8,943,000, notes reserved decreased £433,000, government securities decreased £7,006,000. The proportion of the bank's reserve to liability this week is 13.63 per cent; last week it was 13.21.

Refined Sugars Unchanged
New York, Dec. 11.—The refined sugar market remains unchanged at 5 1/2 per cent for cash, for fine granulated. Sales of new crop Cuban on Wednesday consisted of 14,000 bags for February loading at 8 1/2 c. o. b., and 7,000 bags for June loading at 8 1/2 c. o. b. The United States sugar equalization board made no purchases of raw yesterday.

The average price of twenty active industrial stocks advanced 0.16 per cent yesterday to 107.01, while twenty railroads declined 0.42 per cent to 70.92.

Secretary of the Treasury has authorized the Federal Reserve bank of Philadelphia on and after Monday, December 15, 1919, and until further notice, to redeem in cash before January 2, 1920, at the holder's option, at par and accrued interest, to the date of such redemption, Treasury certificates of indebtedness Series A, 1920, maturing January 2, 1920.

The New York Subtreasury gained \$863,000 from the banks yesterday, making a cash net gain since Friday of \$11,711,000.

An estimate printed on a financial news ticker putting November sales of copper metal at 140,000,000 pounds is extremely liberal. Trade authorities who are in a position to know, say that the total metal sold last month did not run much over 100,000,000 pounds.
