During the last year there has been an increase in turnover from 7,500,000 pounds sterling to more than 9,000,000. Sir Horace Plunkett, who presided at the meeting, while recalling the fact that the society was not political and included men of all parties, condemned any government proposal for dividing Ireland into two parts.
