Every team gets it now and then and the results attained by the Red and Blue since the beginning of the 1917 semester are as good, if not better, than any other university in the country.

Doesn't Know Defeat
There's one young man in Penn sports who has played in thirty-four contests in a wee bit over two seasons and doesn't know what it is to be trimmed. And he's not a poker player either.

Danny McNichol, son of the late James P. McNichol, and a member of a family famous in athletics is the young man who has hung up this remarkable record. This is believed to be a record and no one can prove that it isn't. If they can they are invited to do so.

Before this year goes any further let it be clearly understood that football is not the sport in which Danny made his run of victories. Dan is well acquainted with the dregs that come with gridiron defeats.

Basketball Big Sport
Dan's big sport is basketball and for more than two years he has been prancing on the Weightman Hall court and on foreign floors and always Penn has been victorious.

He started with the freshman team of two years ago, and right at the beginning he set records. The yearling quintet of that season breezed through the schedule without dropping a game and nineteen were won. It was one of the best freshman teams ever turned out at any college, and whenever they were matched against the varsity it was better than an intercollegiate game.

Last season Dan made the varsity hands down, beating out Joe Mitchell, a seasoned veteran, to a guard position. And last year every game he played in was a victory. McNichol was stricken with grip and was in his bed when the squad left for New Haven for a game with Yale. The Blue handed the Quakers a defeat that night, but that can't be charged against Danny's record.

DEMPESEY DEMANDS MUST BE LOWERED

Theodore Vienne Representative Says French Have Too Many Taxes to Pay

NO PROFITS FOR PROMOTER

Milwaukee, Wis., Dec. 20.—That Jack Kearns, manager of Jack Dempsey, will have to reduce his demands for 50 per cent of the receipts for a bout with Georges Carpentier is the statement made today by B. F. Steinel, Milwaukee representative of Theodore Vienne and his associates. Mr. Steinel said that it is entirely out of the question for a promoter in France to pay any such percentage, and he figures that a million-dollar gate would be taken in before there would be any profit.

Kearns Denies Everything

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 20.—Jack Kearns, manager for Jack Dempsey, denied today he had ever made any special demands of any kind concerning the champion's percentage of the gate receipts if Dempsey meets Georges Carpentier, European title holder.

Dempsiey's American Representative, That I Demanded 50 per cent of the receipts of a bout with Carpentier isn't of especial value.

In the first place, Vienne's offer of \$100,000 isn't being considered; in the second place, I haven't made any such demands. Dempsiey, however, will receive as much money from this bout as the promoters, or there won't be any fight. That's sure. Jack does not have to go to France to fight. I got a telegram late last night from some business men of Pueblo, Col., offering \$250,000. Colonel Miller, of Oklahoma, says he will outbid any American promoter. Dominick Tortorich, of New Orleans, is anxious to obtain the go.

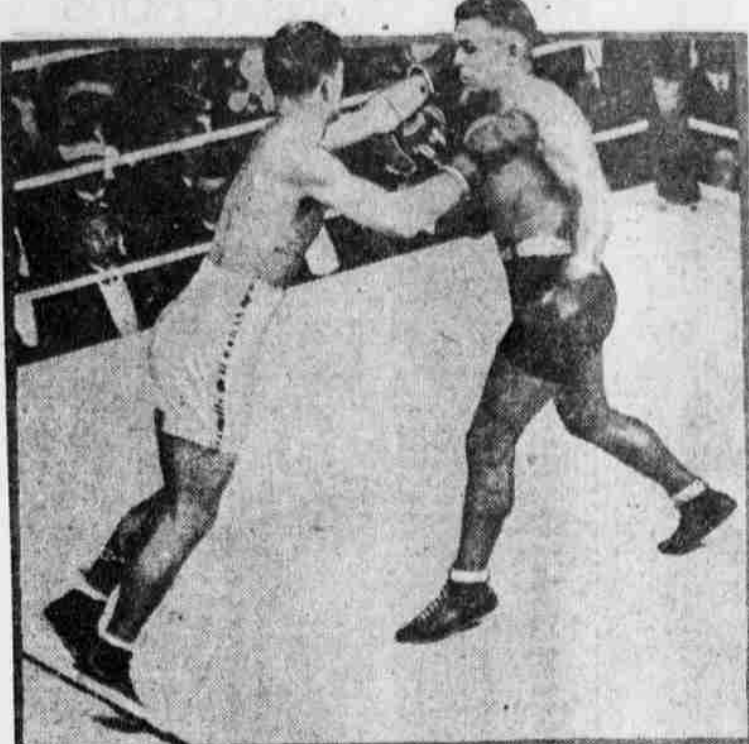

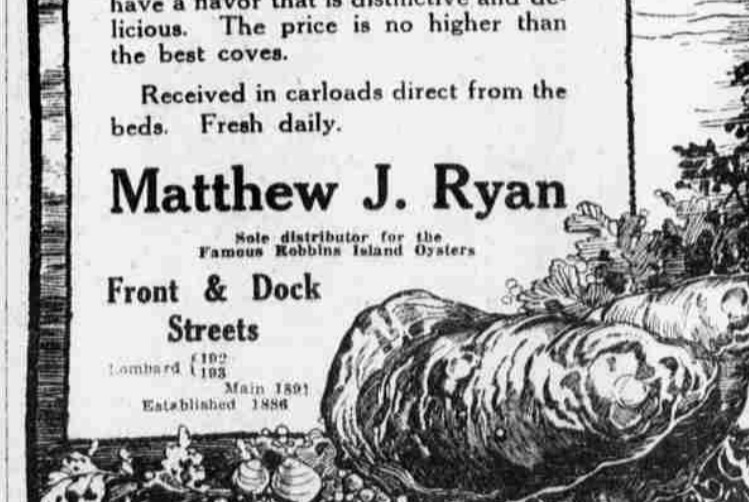

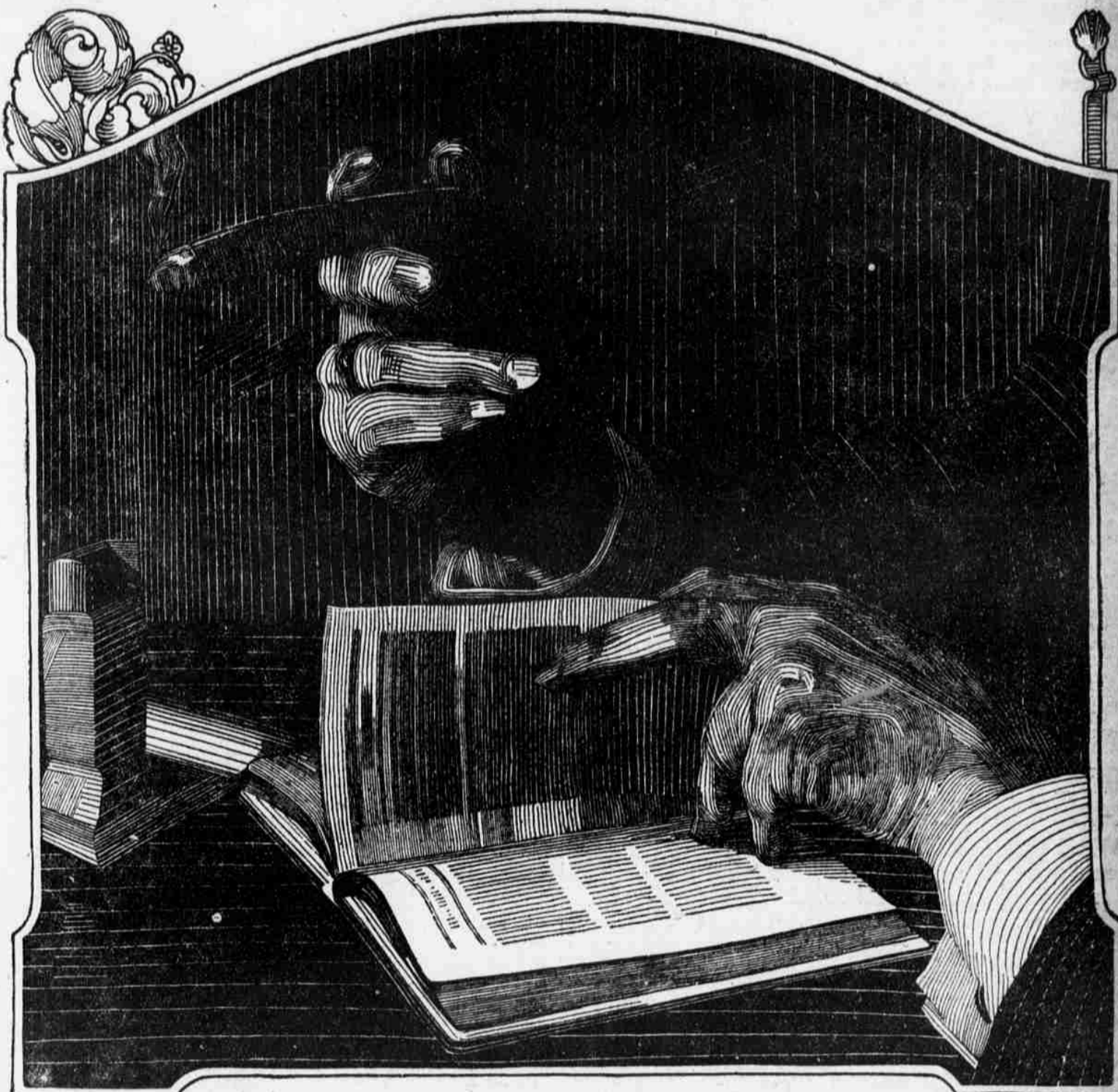
