

Part of \$1,320,214,551 for Gospel Work Will Be Used to Reform I. W. W.

PROVIDE MINISTERIAL AID

Special Dispatch to Evening Public Ledger. Atlantic City, Jan. 8.—A grand total of \$1,320,214,551 is the most sum that will suffice to carry the Gospel to every corner of the world, according to a five-year budget submitted to the inter-church world movement in convention here today by experts of the inter-church world movement in convention here.

This vast amount includes \$906,412,932, which the twenty-eight allied denominations have contracted to raise for all purposes during the next five years, together with \$250,131,477 for special types of undenominational activities and \$77,670,882 specially for use in areas into which none of the denominations thus far has carried Christianity's message.

Philadelphia representatives in the meeting of 1900 church leaders today said the \$60,175,326 which has been apportioned in the budget for ministerial relief is not too great. A stirring appeal for greater interdenominational liberality in dealing with hospitals and homes for children and old folks was heard today.

Migratory labor offers the greatest problem confronting the church in its campaign to carry Americanization and the gospel to the masses at large, in the opinion of Dr. C. L. Fry. There are \$173,612,224 States a million and a half men constantly on the move, virtually untaught by the church, he said.

The plan is to establish central training camps from which to send forth trained mission workers and to appropriate \$200,000 annually for five years for a publicity campaign in the various labor and chain it to home conditions. Ralph E. Diefenderfer, director of the home survey, appealed to the conference today to give heed to the needs of the untaught masses, and Dr. George W. Hinnman discussed the problems created by the influx of Orientals on the Pacific coast. E. Lindquist set forth the need of Christian influences for the American Indians.

The interchurch conference will ask the Protestant denominations to underwrite \$173,612,224 in addition to their own budgets for work in foreign fields and \$154,189,135 for home missionary activities, the latter in addition to \$178,083,881 appropriated by the allied churches for five years.
