

**CENTURIES OF LAW  
IN CARSON LIBRARY**

Large Collection of Books Shows  
Development of Legal  
Procedure

**REPORTS ON GREAT TRIALS**

One of the most remarkable collections of law books in the world is in Philadelphia, in the library of Hampton L. Carson, president of the American Bar Association, and formerly attorney general of Pennsylvania. Some thirty general of law books have been examined by the experts who have examined it and declare it to be superior to the famous collection at the British Museum, or those at Oxford, Cambridge and Harvard universities.

The collection forms a complete record of the development of the common law from the time of Alfred the Great, when it had its beginning, to the present time. The first examples of the eighth century are followed through the development of the law in Great Britain, with its adoption by the colonies at the time of the Revolution. Then come the volumes showing the application of the law by Chief Justice Marshall, and other distinguished jurists, down to the present time.

Among the books in the collection are law reports of cases from the earliest times down to the present, both in England and America. The first great trial of importance on record in this collection is that of Sir Walter Raleigh; the last that of Sir Roger Casement. There are full reports of all the great criminal trials in this country undertaken by the federal government; a complete collection of first editions of law publications of the period of Blackstone, including twenty-one English editions and sixteen American, all originals. The earliest is dated 1700.

There is an original edition of the earliest printed book, date 1400, and the identical copy of the laws of Scotland and used by King James.

In the collection of portraits are British and American jurists and statesmen of note, as well as every member of every United States Supreme Court bench. There are more than 12,000 of these portraits.

There is also a manuscript division. More than 20,000 precious papers and letters are in the Carson collection, each preserved in a separate box. There are records of court cases of the thirteenth century in the penmanship of the court clerks of that time; others running down through the printed ages, until the printing press then takes up the story.

**PRICE AT VETERANS' BALL**  
Third Regiment Reception Largest Reunion in Its History

Major General William G. Price was the guest of honor at a reception and ball given by the Veteran Guard, Third Regiment of the National Guard of Pennsylvania, last night in the Bellevue-Stratford.

The affair was an occasion for one of the largest reunions of officers and their families in the history of the National Guard of the state. About 500 were present. Among the guests were Vice Admiral Hilary P. Jones, Major General James B. Connelley, C. T. O'Neill and Charles Miller, Brigadier Generals Harry C. Trexler, Charles T. Cresswell and Edward C. Shannon. A feature of the ball was a military march, led by General Price and Admiral Jones.

Michael Dorizas, Former Penn Athlete, to Discuss Near East

Tomorrow's lecture will be on "Palestine and Syria," by Michael Dorizas, former University of Pennsylvania athlete, who was attached to the American commission to negotiate peace, and was sent with the committee that investigated conditions in the Near East.

**HARBOR STRIKE ENDS**  
Tugmen Granted Ten-Hour Day and No Sunday Work

The strike of the Masters, Mates, Pilots and Engineers' Association in this port was declared off yesterday afternoon. The strike was called off after a conference between the representatives of the tugboat owners and the strikers.

The strikers were virtually granted all their demands. These were for a ten-hour day and the elimination of Sunday work. The conference, which lasted nearly all day, was arranged by William Tracy, chief of the bureau of mediation and arbitration, at the request of Clifford B. Connally, of the Commission of Labor and Industry of Pennsylvania.
