The campaign of the Federation of Jewish Charities went over the goal of \$1,100,000 by \$14,000, according to reports of teamworkers and captains finally presented last night. They met in the roof garden of the Bellevue-Stratford at what was thought would be the concluding dinner of the campaign. It was announced that the federation should strive for \$1,250,000. Colonel Samuel D. Lit, chairman of the campaign committee, asked the workers if they were willing to continue their efforts until that sum had been realized. His proposition was greeted enthusiastically. The teams will have luncheon once more Thursday when it is expected the fund will have reached \$1,250,000.

The success of the drive was not the only matter of interest at the campaign dinner. Great enthusiasm prevailed when Jules E. Mastbaum raised subscriptions of \$70,000 in a \$100,000 fund that is to be established to help young men get a start in business and make it possible for honest business people in straitened circumstances to berrow money without going to loan sharks. The raising of this fund last night was entirely unexpected and was the most sensational event of the evening.
