Paris, Jan. 27.—The pugilistic career of Louis de Pontieu, featherweight champion of France, ended yesterday when surgeons amputated his left hand to save the fighter's life. He met Tancy Lee, the British champion, in this city on Christmas day and though he knocked out his opponent in the seventeenth round of their bout, he injured his hand and blood poisoning developed.



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
