

PLANS TO INCREASE NUMBER OF STORES

George T. Sale, Head of "10 Per Cent" Scheme, May Give All His Time to Object

DENIES CHARGE OF MAYOR

Although he has had a clash with Mayor Moore, George T. Sale is busy today with plans to increase the number of his "10 per cent above cost" stores here. He says he is thinking of turning his real estate business over to an agent and devoting his entire time to the chain of stores.

Mr. Sale denies Mayor Moore's charge that he exceeded his authority as a member of the old Market Commission and had bought and sold government food in the name of the commission. In opening the "10 per cent above cost" stores, he said, he and Joseph S. MacLaughlin acted as individuals and not as members of the Market Commission.

"At the meeting of December 4, and on other occasions," said Mr. Sale, "we made it clear that in establishing these stores and in selling these goods we acted on our own initiative and responsibility. I should like to know what Mr. Moore thinks we have done that is wrong? Have we done anything criminal? The only thing we have done has been to give a lot of poor people food at much lower prices than they could have bought it at ordinary grocery stores. I do not think it is criminal, for instance, to sell some poor devil with four or five kids lunch at twenty-five cents a pound when the price elsewhere is fifty cents. The 10 per cent stores speak for themselves. They have relieved the cost of living to those who have chosen to patronize them and they have not done it in the name of the city of Philadelphia.

Mayor Moore refuses to discuss Mr. Sale's statements.

"It is absurd to ask me to enter into controversy with a man who runs a grocery store," he declared. "Let Mr. Sale continue his stores if he wants to but he cannot use the name of the city in doing it. That is all I care to say about Mr. Sale and his stores.

Mr. Sale now has seven stores open. The prices charged, as compared with the current market prices, are:
