

The opera perhaps might have been better cast than it was. The cast as a whole sang their parts effectively, but there was considerable left to be de-sired in the dramatic end and the action throughout was not of the best. It is essentially an opera of two parts, Cleopatra and Meiamoun, although Mardion has considerable to do until her untimely demise in the first act. The other parts are all of the mest in-cidental nature. The ballet which was cidential nature. The future of the opera is problem-atical. It might be that with more dramatic action and some necessary changes in the libretto, substituting more poetic English for some of the everyday sentences which now dot it the work would be much more effective D The music generally is excellent, al-though it must be said that it is not particularly consistent in style, nor does it always fit the dramatic situations to the extent which would be expected of a composer of Mr. Fadley' experience.
