

SHROVE TUESDAY ANNOUNCES LENT

Forerunner of Penitential Season, Which Opens Tomorrow, Ash Wednesday

NOON SERVICES PLANNED

Shrove Tuesday, forerunner of the Lenten season, is being observed in this city in common with the Christian world today.

In the early times the faithful on the eve of the penitential period preceding Easter were accustomed to "shrive" themselves by confessing their sins, hence the name.

Less religious observers celebrated the day by a "farewell" to social gayeties in the form of grotesque and fantastic revues, of which the "Mardi Gras" of New Orleans are survivals. The names of these observances are explanatory, "mardi gras" in French meaning "fat Tuesday," and the carnival "carne vale" or "farewell to flesh."

The beginning of Lent will be widely observed in Philadelphia tomorrow with special services.

St. Stephen's Theatre has been engaged for an Ash Wednesday service at noon by the Episcopal Church, and noon services will also be held in the Diocesan Church of St. Mary's, Broad Street, South Street, St. Stephen's Church, Tenth Street above Chestnut, and Old Christ Church, Second Street above Market. Daily services at the Mission, 225 South Third Street, will also mark the Lenten season.

Bishop Rhinelander will conduct services tomorrow in the Diocesan Church of St. Mary for the Episcopal clergy of this diocese. Services under the auspices of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew will be conducted at the Garrison Theatre during Lent.

Bishop Rhinelander will address the first of these meetings tomorrow, on Thursday the Rt. Rev. Thomas J. Green will be the speaker, and on Friday and Saturday the Rt. Rev. Ethelbert Talbot will speak.

At Old St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Fifth Street and Willings Alley, there will be a noon service tomorrow conducted by the Rev. Father Mulry. Throughout Lent there will be noon services at Old St. Joseph's on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, and evening services Wednesdays and Fridays, conducted by the pastor, the Rev. Father E. G. Brown.

This is the beginning of the annual season of fasting in the spring, observed by many churches as the preparation and as a time of special penitence. Its duration is forty days—the forty weeks preceding Easter, the first being Ash Wednesday.
