

5000 WILL ATTEND LEGION MEMORIAL

Next of Kin of Slain Service Men Invited to Washington Birthday Services

JUSSERAND TO BE SPEAKER

Five thousand persons will attend the memorial exercises of the American Legion in the Metropolitan Opera House on Washington's Birthday, February 22, on which occasion the memorial certificates of the republic of France will be presented to the next of kin of Philadelphia soldiers dead. A statement authorized by the Philadelphia county committee sets forth the detailed arrangements for the services.

Ambassador Jusserand, of France, and Governor Sproul will make addresses, the committee on arrangements, of which George Wentworth Carr, county chairman of the American Legion, is the head, announced that Ambassador Jusserand will arrive at the Baltimore and Ohio station, Forty-fourth and Chestnut streets, at 12:25 o'clock Sunday afternoon. He will be met by Mr. Carr and escorted to the Ritz-Carlton Hotel for luncheon.

2000 Reserved Seats

Approximately 2000 reserved seats for the Metropolitan exercises on Washington's birthday have been distributed to the next of kin of the dead in the army and navy. The committee found that as the seating capacity of the first floor and balcony, exclusive of the boxes, is approximately 2000, it would not be possible to provide the next of kin with more than one ticket for each family.

Philadelphia's seventy-eight posts of the American Legion will be represented at the memorial services by the post commanders, vice commanders and adjutants. Franklin D'Olier, national commander of the American Legion, will preside.

In order that the exercises may not be interrupted by late-comers, the doors will be opened at 2 p. m. and will positively be closed at 2:45. Persons having stage tickets will enter at the stage door, on Carlisle street, at the rear of the opera house, and will retain their tickets, as the color indicates the location of the seats on the stage.

Noted Officers to Attend

Distinguished representatives of the army, navy and marine corps will participate in the program. General Charles H. Muir, who commanded the Keystone Division and the Fourth Army Corps in France, will come from Fort Leavenworth, Kan. Major General William H. Hay, who succeeded General Muir in command of the Keystone Division, will come from Brownsville, Tex. Colonel Edward L. King, chief of staff of the Twenty-eighth Division,

will arrive from Newport, R. I., Saturday. Major General Charles M. Clement, of Sunbury, Pa., who commanded the Twenty-eighth Division at Camp Hancock, Ga., prior to its departure to France, will be present.

General Muir, Major General Hay and Colonel King will be at the Union League during their stay in this city.

The marine corps has mailed its memorial certificates to the next of kin, but the committee on arrangements, being desirous of inviting the families to attend the memorial services, through the aid of Colonel L. J. McGill, adjutant of the marine corps base at Philadelphia, obtained the list of the marine's next of kin and all will receive invitations.
