

STREET CLEANING SURVEY IS URGED

Municipal Research Bureau Suggests Investigation Would Supply Data for Council

CHARTER GIVES NEW PLAN

A complete survey of the street cleaning situation in this city was suggested today by the bureau of municipal research.

Such a survey, it was asserted, would provide Council with data on which to decide if street cleaning next year is to be done directly by the city or by the present contract system.

After December 31 of this year the city is directed by the new charter to assume the task of street cleaning and the collection of ashes, garbage and refuse.

The provision is made, however, that Council, by a majority vote, may authorize a continuance of the present contract system, either in whole or in part.

Statement By Bureau

The bureau's statement, in part, follows:

"It is quite true that the question of street cleaning is a matter of administrative and financial expediency—it should not be treated as a matter of political expediency. Most certainly the city should not attempt to 'bite off more than it can chew,' and should not take over this work any faster than the facilities and organization can be developed.

"When once the city actually carries on the work, and not simply inspects it, the responsibility will rest directly on municipal officials without either shoulders to shift to, and there either should be an adequate organization to render the service that will be demanded by the public.

"Having been told in the past that clean streets could be expected only under municipal operation, which was long denied us by the Legislature, the citizen will quite naturally expect more effective work to be done by the city.

"The city must, therefore, plan to conduct this work in a businesslike, adequate and effective manner."

Now Is Time to Plan

"In order to give time for study and planning, the date of commencement of municipal operation was set ahead in the new charter to January 1, 1921. However, prior to August 1, bids may be requested for contract work with municipal work."

"Before this step is taken the existing specifications should be closely scrutinized and, if necessary, revised, to provide for the same type of service which it will be planned to render under municipal operation. It will be necessary also to make careful studies of the entire situation to guide the Council in making its decision this coming fall.

"It is absolutely essential for the city administration to know what plants and equipment will be needed and how they can be acquired; what personnel will be necessary; and what will be the required capital outlay and yearly cost of operation of the municipal street cleaning, and to the allied work of ash refuse and garbage collection and disposal."

Military College Will Confer Degree on Senator and Others

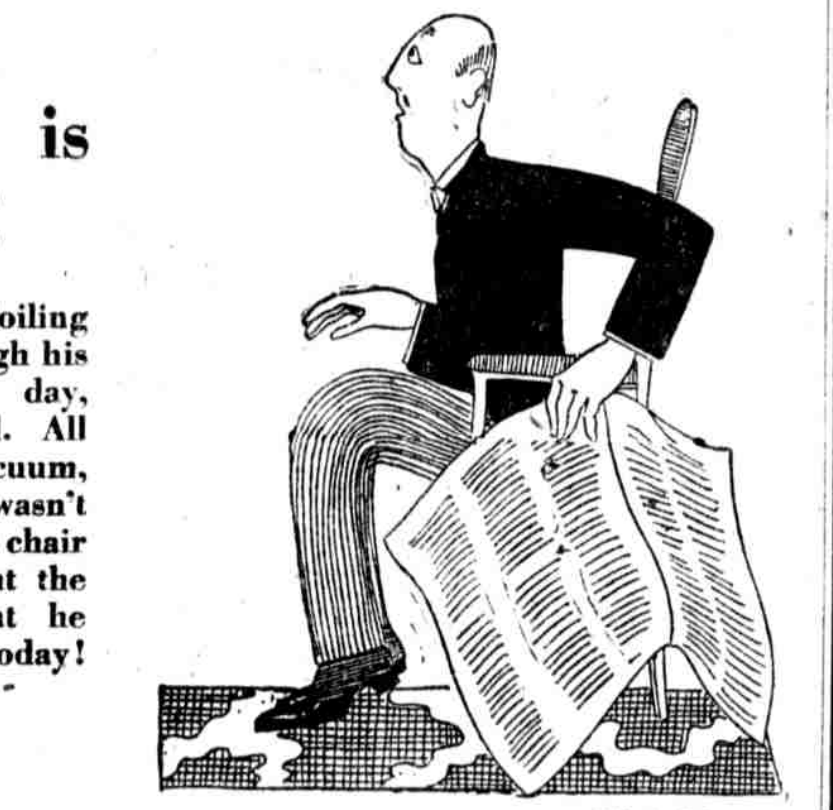
