

## GENERAL HAY JOINS LEGION POST HERE

Former Twenty-Eighth Division  
Commander Becomes Member  
Benjamin Franklin Unit

## RAILWAY POST WILL MEET

Major General William H. Hay, U. S. A., former commander of the Twenty-eighth Division, has joined the Benjamin Franklin Post No. 405, American Legion.

This announcement was made today by Dr. A. C. Abbott, post commander, who conferred with General Hay when the latter came here Sunday from Brownsville, Tex., to attend the distribution of the French memorial certificates.

"It has pleased me very much," General Hay, "to watch the development of the American Legion. I would like to see every man who was in the army become a member. I trust that its principles will be very rigidly adhered to and that particularly it will avoid participation in partisan politics."

## BETHANY TO CELEBRATE

Legionnaires in George F. Baer Post No. 312 have planned a get-together meeting at the Y. M. C. A., Spring Garden Street Station, for Monday evening, to enlist former service men who are now employees of the Reading Railway.

Post Commander P. S. Lewis has prepared a placard saying in part: "Post No. 312 of the American Legion, to be known as the George F. Baer Post, has been permanently established, with headquarters at the Y. M. C. A., Spring Garden Street Station."

Regular meetings will be held on the first and third Mondays of each month, and will be in the nature of informal gatherings or smokers to preserve the memories and incidents of our association in the great war, and to foster and perpetuate a 100 per cent Americanism in the community.

## Should Join One Post

"On account of the nature of their employment, their close associations and their common interests, all Philadelphia and Reading Railway service men should unite in a common post."

"Send in your application for membership in the George F. Baer Post to P. J. Pirraglia, post adjutant, Room 313, Reading Terminal, Philadelphia, with initiation fee of \$1. Any men who have already joined a post may transfer without expense by application to the post adjutant."

"All Philadelphia and Reading Railway men, whether members of other posts or not yet affiliated with the

Legion, are invited to attend a big get-together meeting, to be held at the Y. M. C. A., Spring Garden Street Station, at 8 p. m., Monday, March 1.

Louis S. Potsdamer, commander of David W. Jameson Post No. 183, has been appointed chairman of the memorial services to be held in the Thirty-second ward.

These services will be held under the joint auspices of Post Nos. 183, 204 and 37. Details for the presentation of the French memorial certificates at such a meeting will be announced later, following a joint meeting of the committees from these three posts. The first meeting is called for tonight.

Post No. 183 has opened a war risk clearing house, and is now attempting to clear up those war risk tangles which are still bothering some of the men of the Legion.

Women nurses who served in corps of the army or navy may become members of the American Legion. This has been announced by Franklin D'Olier, national commander of the Legion.

Nurses who went over in the American Red Cross service are not eligible.

A memorial home for the soldiers and sailors of Burlington, N. J., is the plan of the Captain James MacFarland Post, No. 79, American Legion, in that place. To help raise funds for that memorial, a novel leap year method will be employed.

The scheme, which was suggested by James H. Birch, Jr., calls for the donation by all residents of the city of their pay for the 29th of February.

Because of unsettled conditions at present, the plan has been temporarily postponed, but will be put into practice at a later date.

The donations of Burlington residents will not be limited to the one day's extra pay resulting from leap year.

Many residents have already given very generously, and it is believed that others will follow suit.

The plans of Mr. Birch and others concerning the erection of the memorial were discussed at a meeting held in the Elks' Home recently.

## WORK QUIET BUT EFFICIENT

Detectives from the Fifteenth street and Snyder avenue police station are searching for the highwayman who held up Harry Weaver, clothier, at 1519 Snyder avenue, last night and took \$23 from the cash register. The robbery was unusually daring, as Weaver's store is only a short way from the police station.

The bandit did not ride to the place in an automobile, according to the custom of modern robbers. He walked to and from his work.

Quietly entering Weaver's store while the proprietor was counting the money

in the cash register, the bandit said: "You can give me that."

His revolver was pointing at Weaver, who made no objection when the man seized the money and thrust it into his pocket.

Although there were many persons passing in the street, the robber acted so quietly that no one saw him except Weaver.

Earlier yesterday, bandits rode to the jewelry store of Walter Zaruszewski, 3164 Kensington avenue, locked the jeweler's wife in the cellar and carried off gems valued at \$18,702.

A city-wide search is being made for the robbers.
