Nancy Wynne Tells What the Colonial Dames of America, Chapter 2, Philadelphia, Have Determined Upon to Preserve American Social Ideals

THERE has been much talk of late, as you know, about certain abuses which have crept into social functions and every one has been asking why some one does not do something. I am so interested to hear that the Colonial Dames of America, Chapter 2, Philadelphia, have taken the matter up and are asking the co-operation of other societies for the furtherance of the good work.
