

LEGION CONSIDERS TRANSPORT FIGHT

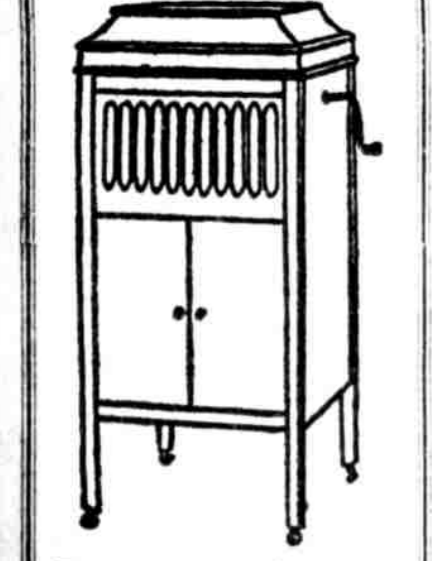
Executive Committee Looks Into Protest Against Dropping Civilians From Corps

Formal protest against withdrawal of civilian personnel and assignment of enlisted personnel to the motor transport corps in Philadelphia has been lodged with the secretary of war on the part of civil service employees and was considered yesterday by the executive committee of the American Legion.

It is contended by employees under civil service that it is more expensive to use enlisted men than civilian chauffeurs at \$1200 per annum. Sixty men were discharged last Saturday. It is feared by the 175 remaining employees that they will be dismissed by March 10. One hundred and eighty-five enlisted men have been ordered here from Camp Dix.
