In Fig. 4 he has hit the ball with his right knee bringing his back into the shot. His whole body is hurled into the follow through of Fig. 5. Grant keeps both hands on the shaft with left thumb down and right around shaft as shown in Fig. 2.

Sweeney was shut out of the scoring from the floor, but he aided greatly with successful tries out of seven from the foul line.

It was the third league championship for the Quakers and therefore they get permanent possession of the Happe trophy which has been up for a competition for the last ten years. Penn won it first in 1915-16 and again in 1917-18.

Only two games remain on the Red and Blue slate. These are with Yale and Princeton. The Blue battle is scheduled for New Haven, but the Tiger game will be played in Weightham Hall next Saturday night. It looks as if it would be a close game, but through the season without a defeat.

It was the second win the season over Columbia in swimming and Penn stands second in the league, standing one behind Yale and one behind Lehigh. Eddie Shields was the individual star, with victories in the century and the four-long. Eddie also swam anchor on the four-long.

PRESS DOWN ON KNEE AND CLUB, SAYS GRANT

Pennsylvania Golf Champion Likes Buckled Left Knee for "Rock Bottom" Stance; Hugs Clubhead to Ground With Straight Left Arm

AT GRANT went through, where the power with which he has brought his back, or right thigh and his into the shot is shown.

"I throw my body in with a bent right toward the ground," finished the amateur star, "and I consider this the best part of all in my shot for power, control and everything else, aside from the swing of the straight left arm."

Grant then took his natural short grip and made some real shots.

studied and practiced its theories with all the vigor he had put into his football work at Harvard.

Grant entered the national last season at Oakland, but failed to qualify.

The next day, on a bet, he shot a score there in the low 70s. Some days after the national, in a field that contained M. I. T., but the New Englanders were the national medalist, two seminautists fresh from Oakland and several other stars who played in the rounds for the American championship. Grant beat the whole field for the Pennsylvania amateur championship, his first tournament win.

Sound Theories

For his golf matches he goes through regular exercises and training, eating only certain things, just as he used to in his football campaign. For the links he has evolved a number of theories, but when asked to set them forth, he replied that he had not yet given them enough of a tryout.

In particular, Grant believes in the short shaft, depending for his shot on the club in hand. He, therefore, spares no shot, playing one as vigorously as another, and letting the clubface make the shot.

Grant is shown in the illustrations in his vigorous play of a wooden shot, though in actual play he uses a devious grip.

"There are three points," began the Pennsylvania state champion, "which I believe have a real advantage for the game of any one. I know they are the key-stone of my own game and have helped me."

The first of these, he said, was the straight left arm on addressing the ball and through the back swing.

"That is the way I control my direction," stated Grant, "and it makes for distance. Equally important is the buckling of the left knee on the back swing. I bend down on that knee with all my strength as far as possible for a firm stance. I believe a golfer is holding up if he does not press down like that, that he is unbalanced, not firm, and is not working on a good rock bottom."

This is shown in the first and third illustrations.

Press Club Down

"My second point," continued Grant, "is pressing the clubhead down as it goes back. I do this in order to get the full benefit of a straight left arm. The arm continues straight on the back, the clubhead comes off the ground as the result of this straight left arm."

The first figure shows him sweeping his clubhead back along the ground as far as it will go until the straight left arm forces it to rise.

"The third point," explained Grant, "is bringing the part one sits on into the shot."

This is well shown in the fourth and fifth figures of the champion. In these he is shown just after the hit and lastly at the finish of his powerful follow-through.

That the American Legion may co-operate fully with the Grand Army of the Republic and the United Spanish War Veterans in celebration of memorial events of military and naval importance, the committee on co-operation was appointed today by George Wentworth Carr, county chairman of the Legion.

This committee will be headed by Benjamin H. Golder, an attorney, a member of the state legislature and representative in the county committee of Post No. 37. The committee members are: W. W. Green, Post No. 297; Thomas H. Egan, Post No. 41; assistant director of Public Safety; Chas. W. Weylan, Post No. 288; and Solomon Glick, Post No. 153.

Other Bodies Guests

Selection of the committee at this time was considered important because of the approaching Memorial Day exercises, in which the various veteran organizations will undoubtedly join. The Grand Army of the Republic and the United Spanish War Veterans are guests of the Legion at the recent Metropolitan Opera House meeting incident to the presentation of the French memorial certificate.

Four hospital beds for the use of members of Walter M. Gearty Post No. 315, have been established in city hospitals.

The post has organized a building and loan association. A forty-two-piece band has been formed, and seeks Legion and other engagements. Walter M. Gearty has resigned as the representative of the county committee, and J. H. Van Zant was elected to take his place.

The question whether the posts in the county favor adjusted compensation for former service men, as urged upon Congress by the national organization, has been placed before the individual posts for their action. Post No. 315 endorsed the bonus proposition at its meeting.

Committee Ratified

The county committee has also ratified the position taken by the national executive committee, under the terms of which the amount of compensation for compensation is left entirely with Congress to be dealt with in fairness to the whole country.
