

PHILS HUSTLING IN WARMER WEATHER

Three Hours' Straight Practice at Bat and Fielding Brings Out the Arnica Bottle

Birmingham, Ala., March 12.—Trainer Les Miller's stock of oil, liniment, alcohol and rubbing fluid was used to good use last night around the hotel where most of the Phillies were nursing sore arms and cursing the weather man. The Phils are just beginning to feel the effects of their jogging and throwing. Cravath sent his men through three hours of batting, fielding and jogging under dark-lantern skies that gave away to old Sol every now and then. The temperature was ideal, although a wind from the south interfered with high flies knocked to right field. Dave Bancroft put in his first practice and had no trouble in locating the sphere as it came waffling over the field. He lined out a couple of ailing infield hits which Lee Meadows ducked as they wheezed past him at short. Bancroft took about fifteen minutes of fielding practice and spent the rest of the session jogging around the ball field. Casey Stengel continues to do more road work than any other man on the squad. He is having some trouble in getting his lower limbs in condition. He has about stopped limping. The field was too soggy for fielding practice the first hour out and Cravath sent his men through a long process of tanning. He hopes to begin instructing his men in base running just as soon as they have enough road work under their feet. Tom Emerich, the unexpected arrival from the hub of the automobile industry, is certainly hitting like a streak of blue lightning in batting practice. He is being closely watched by Carlton Moleworth, manager of the Birmingham team, who will no doubt make an overture to the Phillies for his services. Ralph Miller, the third sacker, reported for his first practice Thursday and took only a moderate amount of batting practice. He devoted most of his time to jogging around the outfield. Miller is expected to make business pick up around the bravery corner and it will be interesting to watch him and Wrightstone battle it out for the hot sector. Beginning Friday the Phils will split the warmest hours of the day with the Birmingham Braves, who began training today. The first exhibition game between the two clubs is slated for one week from today.
