

CHAMBER TO SCAN FINANCES OF P. R. T.

Commerce Body's Committee Is for Better Service and Higher Fares if Necessary

MORE EQUIPMENT NEEDED

The Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce has voiced a demand for better trolley service by the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Co., but is not opposed

to an increase in fares provided the financial condition of the P. R. T. makes the increase necessary. Following the statement by Samuel Clement, Jr., public service commissioner, that it was unfair to expect the P. R. T. to continue the five-cent fare policy, investigation of the P. R. T. finances by a committee of the Chamber of Commerce was announced. "Something has to be done to give better service," said W. P. Barba, chairman of the committee appointed to consider the transit situation. "We must have new equipment, new tracks and the Frankford elevated. My committee is endeavoring to have the city and the traction company get together and work out some agreement on the matter. The company has designated Fr. Fairchild and the city has named Director Twining. We will have a meeting in a day or two. We shall oppose any fare increase that is not shown absolutely necessary. With Mr. Barba on the Chamber of

Commerce committee are H. N. Taylor, Clayton Pike and John C. Frazer. Officials of the P. R. T. would not commit themselves today as to whether the company contemplated an application to increase fares. It was learned that there is a division of sentiment among the directors, who will meet next week. J. J. Sullivan, president of the Union Traction Co., takes the position, it is said, that the public will welcome a six-cent fare if more cars are placed on all the lines and improved service is given.
