

4 BABIES BURNED TO DEATH; 1 HURT

Stoves Are Blamed for Accidents in Which Clothing of Children Caught Fire

3 VICTIMS IN ONE HOUSE

Four babies were burned to death within twenty-four hours at their homes in this city and Camden, the clothing of all of them catching fire from stoves. Another child was seriously burned.

The dead are:
Glady's Anderson, three years old, both of 1431 North Fawn street.
Violet Anderson, five months old; Josephine Tassatack, three years old, 147 Queen street.
Charles Fetzter, fifteen months old, 509 North Tenth street, Camden.
Burned:
Edward Anderson, eighteen months old, 1431 North Fawn street; serious burns.
The Anderson children, who were negroes, were sleeping on the third floor of their home when an overheated oil stove set fire to the bed clothing. Mrs. Mary Anderson, their mother, noticed smoke about 1 o'clock last night and saw wisps of smoke curling from beneath the bedroom door.
She screamed for help and Patrolman Lucas, of the Eighth and Jefferson streets station, rushed into the house and, snatching the children from the bed, rolled them in a rug, extinguishing the flames. A passing automobile was hailed and the children taken to St. Joseph's Hospital. Violet soon died. Glady's died about 11 o'clock last night. The boy has been sent home again.
Josephine Tassatack, whose mother boarded at 147 Queen street, living in a second-story room, was left alone for a short time last night while her mother was visiting. There was a stove in the room and in some manner the child's clothing became ignited. The mother carried the baby to the Second and Christian streets station, and from there the child was sent to the Mount

200 PASTORS PLAN BIG CHURCH DRIVE

Protestant Clergymen Discuss Campaign for Giant Fund for Interchurch Movement

PROGRAM HAS THREE AIMS

Plans for eastern Pennsylvania's share in the campaign of the Interchurch World Movement for \$200,000,000 were discussed today at a meeting of 200 Protestant clergymen in the Chambers-Wylie Memorial Presbyterian Church.

Thirty denominations were represented at the conference. Their share of the campaign, which opens April 25, has been placed at between \$30,000,000 and \$35,000,000.

The Rev. Herman Eldridge presided at this morning's conference. Lloyd Freeman, regional director of the United Finance Co., traced the origin and growth of the interchurch movement.

The Rev. Dr. George H. Browning, of Newark, N. J., urged the necessity of the amalgamation. He said the church was facing the greatest period in its history.

The program of the amalgamation project includes three general aims. Chief among these is the work of investigation. The various denominations should investigate their origin, it was said, and go deeper into their traditions.

Co-operation will be the second aim of the amalgamated church. Co-operation, it was pointed out, would be of special value in cases where small communities are over-burdened, while larger ones do not have enough churches. Inclusion will be the third subdivision for the general effort. By this, it was said, was meant that the churches should know about the working conditions of the churchgoer, his amusements and the character of his associates.

Following the addresses a pamphlet, known as "The Standard Plan," of the interchurch movement, was read. Following a "denomination luncheon," at which the various denominations sat at their own tables, a general conference was opened. This will be an open

LEGION OFFERS AID TO DISABLED MEN

Each Post Expected to Be Served by Former Service Men Requiring Medical Attention

Disabled soldiers, sailors and marines throughout Pennsylvania, who are in need of medical aid, are urged to use the machinery of the American Legion. This position was set forth today in a bulletin from the state committee on disabled soldiers and medical aid, of which Dr. E. R. Krumpholtz, of Chestnut Hill, is the chairman.

The members of Doctor Krumpholtz's committee on disabled soldiers and medical aid are Dr. William M. Franklin, L. McK. Crumrine, Henry D. Moulthrop, the Rev. B. C. McGuigan, Dr. G. P. Asper, Byron Houck, Guy K. Sembower and Dr. George C. Barry.

In Philadelphia county, a committee to co-operate with the state committee will be announced within the week. It is proposed to develop the question of medical aid in each post so that there will be no member of the Legion who will not obtain efficient and prompt attention.

The John J. Barry Post No. 83 is the recipient of a historical gavel, according to an announcement made today. This gavel was manufactured of English oak recovered from the Delaware river by a diver from the remains of the English warship Augusta, which was sunk in battle opposite Fort Mifflin. This oak had been in the water 142 years. The handle of the gavel was made from a piece of oak wood from the latest American superdreadnought, the Idaho. It was presented to the post by William H. Browne, the historian.

NEW SHIP LINE ANNOUNCES SAILINGS

Six monthly sailings will be maintained by the Lavino Shipping Co., a new line just established here. The first vessel arrived in Philadelphia yesterday with 25,000 bags of cocoa beans. Another vessel is expected shortly with a cargo of 65,000 bags of cocoa beans and five tons of ginger. Announcement of the new line was made today by F. J. Lavino, head of an ore-importing firm.
