

1920 TOME SPORTS SCHEDULED MAY 22

Record Entry List Expected for Fourteenth Annual Meet at Port Deposit

INTERSECTIONAL EVENT

By PAUL PREP May 22 has been announced officially as the date of the TOME interscholastic meet.

Information from TOME is to the effect that many invitations to the games have been received, with prospects of a new record for schools to be represented.

The location of Port Deposit, midway between Philadelphia and Baltimore, causes these events to take on an intersectional aspect.

Since 1902 this meet gradually has increased in the number of contestants and the size of the crowds, until now it is by far the biggest scholastic event in the South.

Secondary schools of importance within a radius of several hundred miles send to TOME on this occasion hundreds of the finest types of schoolboy athletes.

Many records have been made at TOME meets. Among these the performance of Shields, of Mercersburg, has stood out prominently.

In 1916 he established a 2:23.3-5 as the schoolboy mark in the mile run and it still stands.

The 100-yard record has been equaled on three occasions, the last time by Brewer, while running for St. Alban's in 1917.

The track records are held by a number of different schools. Philadelphia Central High established the 120-yard high hurdles mark in 1903 when Lightfoot won in 4:10 record.

The 140 record is held by George School, 220 by Episcopal High of Alexandria, 220 hurdles by Washington Central, 880 by Washington Tech, pole vault by Wilmington High, high jump by Marston's University School and hammer throw by Lawrenceville.
