SOVIET THREATENS POLAND
Russian Note Demands Cessation of Military Action in Ukraine.

Warsaw, March 17.—(By A. P.)—Polish authorities are urged in a third peace note of the Russian soviet government to cease military action in the Ukraine, the Bolsheviks threatening to concentrate their forces against Poland if the latter does not recall its troops from their position in southeastern Russia. The soviet note, which was signed by M. Tolstitchin, requested an immediate answer.

Belief is expressed here the note was inspired by fears in Moscow of a spread of a counter revolution in the Ukraine and southern Russia.

SPEAKERS ASK PLAYGROUND

SIMS FOR UNIFIED NAVAL COMMAND

Says Control of Ships by Cable and Letter Was Impracticable

CALLS FOR AID IGNORED

Washington, March 17.—Unity of command of the allied and American naval forces overseas similar to that which was obtained on the western front was recommended by him to the navy department as early as July, 1917, but was not approved. Rear Admiral Sims today told the Senate committee investigating the navy's conduct of the war.

The admiral said efforts to direct a large force of American ships and men by cable and letter from a point 2000 miles away gave too many opportunities for misunderstandings of messages and for their interception by the enemy.

"The enemy secret service proved itself to be extraordinarily efficient," he said.

In his letter recommending that naval authority be concentrated at London, Admiral Sims said it was unquestionable that efficiency would be greatly improved if any one of the allies were selected to direct all operations, "the

others merely keeping the one selected fully informed of their resources available."

"I realize that my position in London readers me open to suspicion that I may be unduly influenced by the British viewpoint of the war," the admiral's letter stated. "It should not be necessary to state, however, that I have done everything within my ability to maintain a broad viewpoint."

He testified he was unable to bring the Navy Department to a realization of the importance of his post and the necessity for providing a large staff at the outset to compile and digest allied naval information and direct the early details of American co-operation on the seas. His requests for adequate assistance were virtually ignored.

Howard Lee
Howard Lee, a member of the executive board of Camden and a former member of city council, died today at his home, 520 Haddon avenue. He was seventy-two years old. Death was due to a complication of diseases.

For some years past Mr. Lee was a guide at the Camden court house and was known to many persons. He represented the Fourth ward in city council several years ago.

He is survived by a widow, two sons and a daughter.

RED CROSS TAKES CHARGE

Given Absolute Authority Over Estonia During Typhus Epidemic

Reval, Estonia, March 17.—Two governments are holding power in Estonia. One is the regularly constituted legislative body of the country and the other is the American Red Cross, commission under command of Lieutenant Colonel Edward Ryan, of Scranton, Pa.

This commission has been vested with authority to take any measures, political or economic, to stamp out the typhus plague raging here.

The Red Cross has put the country under strict quarantine rules.

ALLIES AT CONSTANTINOPLE
Little Alarm Caused, Although Warships Are Cleared for Action

Constantinople, March 17.—(By A. P.)—Allied troops have occupied this city, and the great guns of the British dreadnought Benbow and other giant allied warships, moored to quays or

anchored in the Golden Horn, command both sides of the Bosphorus. Every ship is cleared for action.

The actual arrival of the allied forces caused little alarm, nor were there any signs of panic except in Stamboul. Shopkeepers near the war office there closed their places of business when it was heard the Allies were coming, but the troops inspired confidence and the stores were soon reopened.

Il Programma Parlamentare e la Situazione Internazionale e' Stata Discussa Lungamente

Roma, 17 marzo.—Terzi il nuovo gabinetto si e' riunito in seduta plenaria. Mancava soltanto l'on. Scialoja, ministro per gli Affari Esteri, il quale trovava tuttora a Parigi.

La riunione e' durata piu' di tre ore e da un comunicato ufficiale si rileva che e' stato discusso il programma parlamentare e specialmente le questioni economiche e gli approvvigionamenti.

Da fonte autorevole si apprende che il presidente del Consiglio dei Ministri, on. Nitti, in detta riunione ha dato luogo a dettagliate comunicazioni relative alla situazione internazionale e principalmente agli eventi che si verificano ora in Germania. Sembra che il Consiglio abbia deliberato di non limitare a queste restrizioni, ma di preferire un atteggiamento di vigilante attesa.

Il deliberato atteggiamento sarebbe stato comunicato telegraficamente dal "Nitti" ai colleghi di Francia ed Inghilterra. Tanto Nitti, quanto Lloyd George sono d'accordo sul tale atteggiamento, mentre la Francia avrebbe preferito un immediato intervento armato.

Generalmente l'attitudine del Governo Italiano di fronte alla controrivoluzione in Germania riscuote la piena approvazione.

Il Consiglio avrebbe deliberato di sopprimere quanto prima possibile la censura e di abolire presto le restrizioni ora imposte al commercio. Relativamente a queste restrizioni sembra che il provvedimento andra' in vigore il primo di giugno prossimo.

Le restrizioni saranno soltanto mantenute per le derrate monopolizzate dal Governo, come lo zucchero ed i cereali.

La rinuncia della Camera, anziche' domani giovedì come prima era stato annunciato, avverra' lunedì prossimo.
