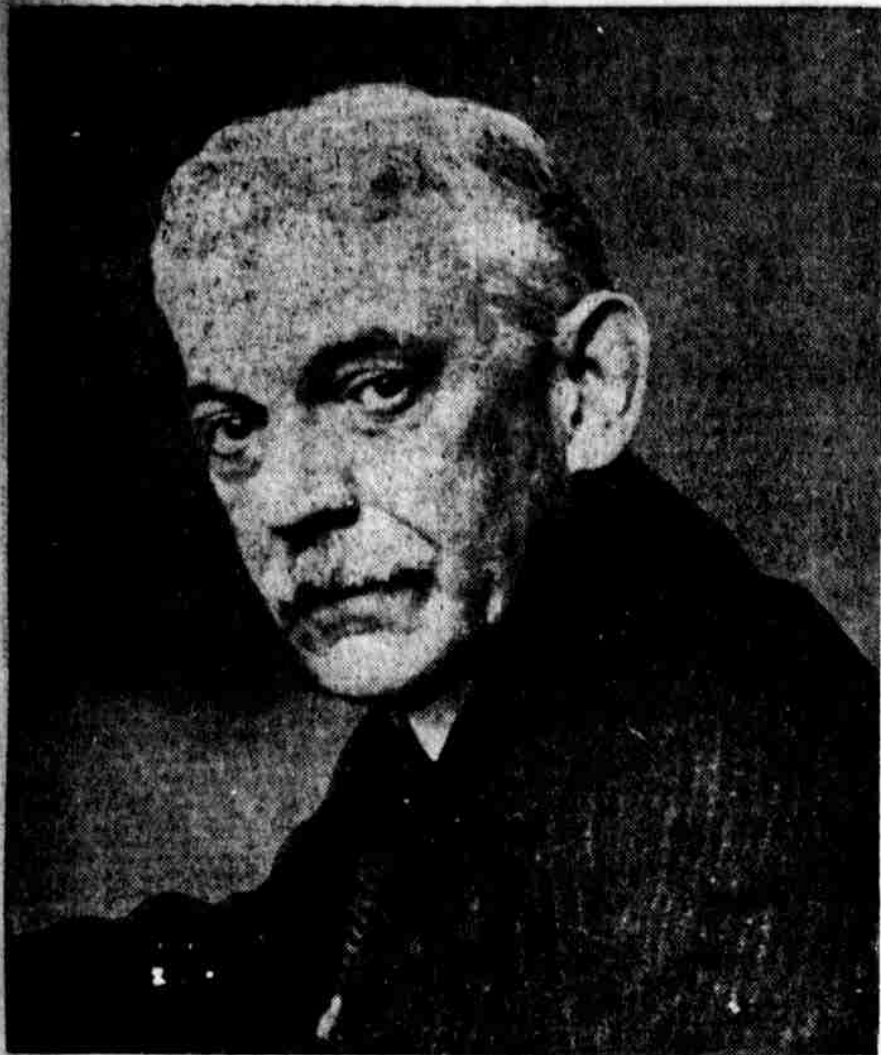


"Ships' Graveyard" in Camden : Deaf People Have Show : Mile Run on Wanamaker Roof

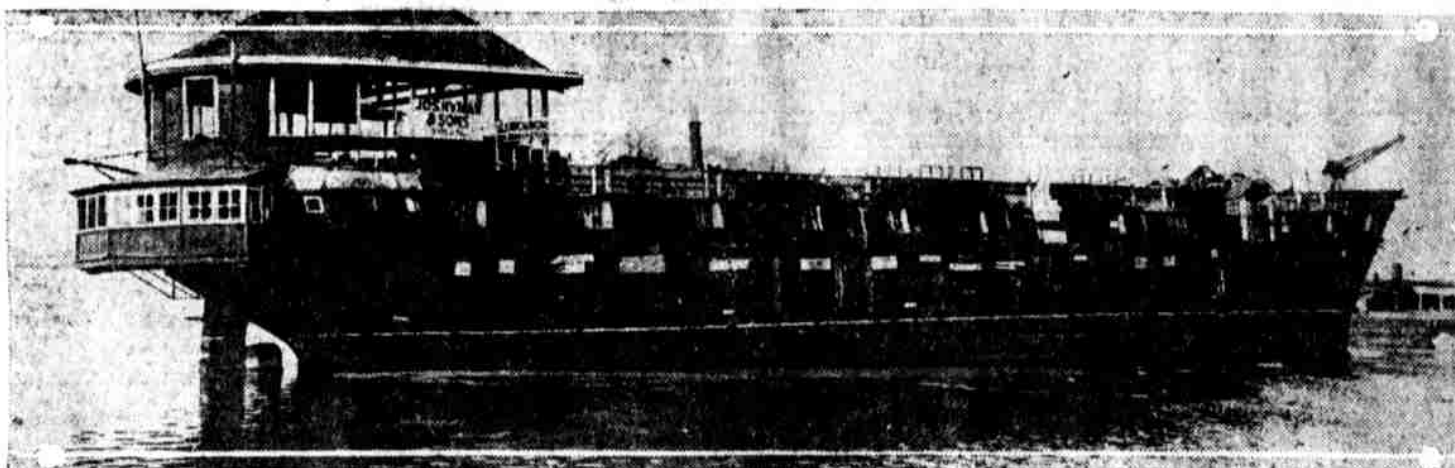

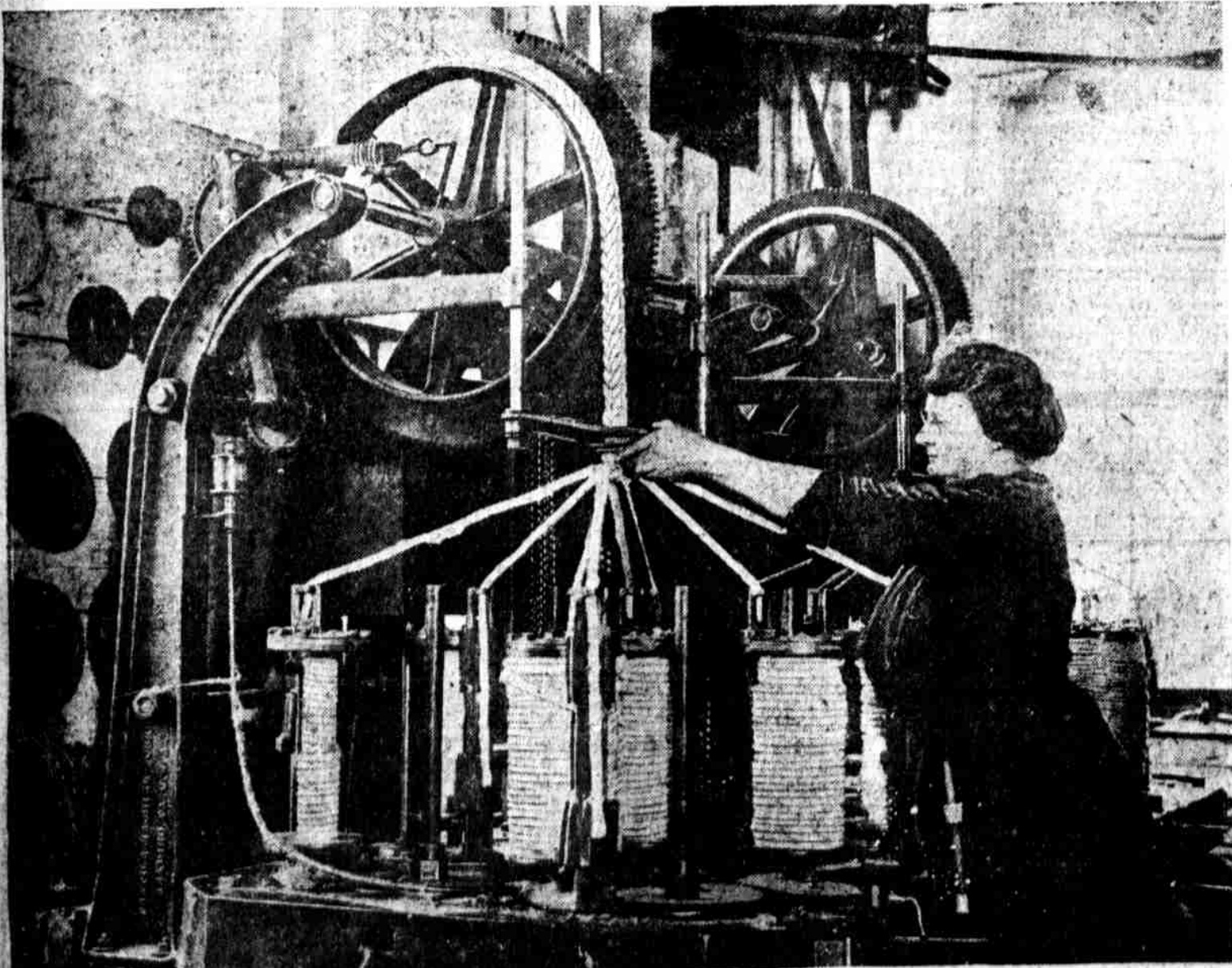

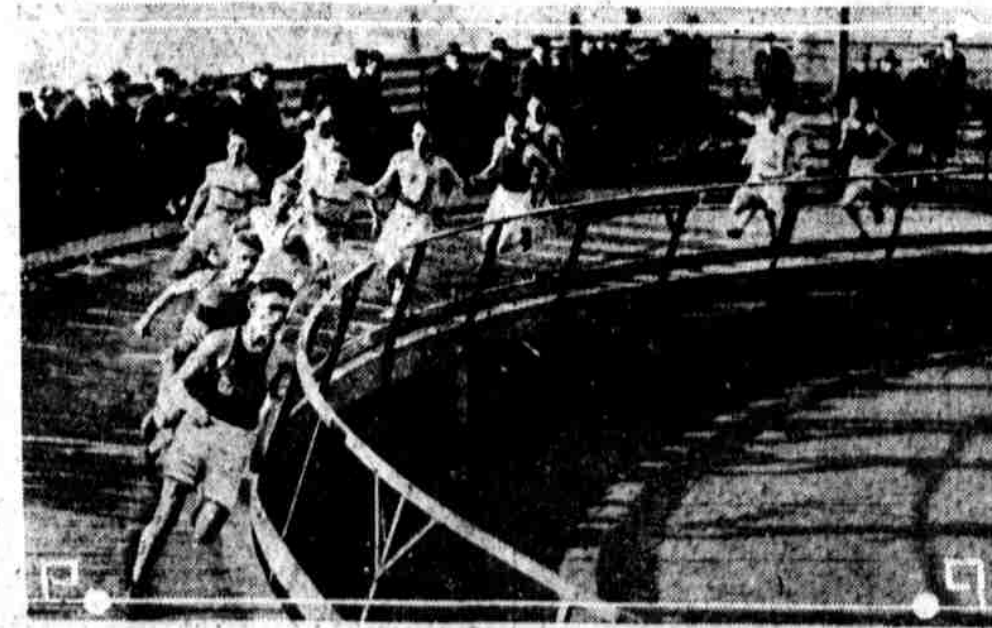
OUR CITY'S WORKERS AND WHAT THEY DO
