

BONUS DELEGATE LEAVES TOMORROW

George F. Tyler Instructed by Overwhelming Majority for Adjusted Compensation

PROPOSE INSURANCE PLAN

George F. Tyler, department commander of the American Legion in Pennsylvania, will go to Washington tomorrow, instructed by an overwhelming majority of the posts in this state to favor adjusted compensation for former service men. Only a negligible number of posts in the Keystone State have gone on record against adjusted compensation, according to reports which have been submitted. There will be a preliminary conference of the American Legion representatives from all the posts of the United States in Washington tomorrow, at which plans will be considered to be presented at a subsequent conference on Monday, to be presided over

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by Franklin D'Olier, national commander. One of the important suggestions that has been made to Commander Tyler by a Legion representative from Pennsylvania is to the effect that whatever sum shall be agreed upon by Congress as adjusted compensation for the former service men shall be applied on converted insurance premiums. This is an entirely new idea and offsets in a measure the objection of adjusted compensation on the basis that it would require an increase in taxes or a bond issue.

The Benjamin Franklin Post No. 405 has enrolled Charles Greenville Wilson, 1700 Spruce street, who is now located in London, England, and to whom a suggestion has been made that an affiliated post of the American Legion be organized in that city. Wilson was in the Eightieth Field

Artillery, Seventieth Division, A. E. F., and was discharged from service May 9, and expects to be in Europe for a year.

American Legion Day will be celebrated in Egyptian Hall of the Wanamaker store tomorrow afternoon at 2:35 o'clock—an appropriate service to which all legionnaires are invited. George Wentworth Carr, the county chairman of the American Legion, will preside.

The speakers will be George S. Stewart, Jr., whose subject will be "The American Legion and Americanization," who is chairman of the Americanization committee of Philadelphia county and a member of Howard B. McCall Post, No. 29, and William H. Pemberton, of the Toga Post, No. 319. Mr. Pemberton is one of the survivors of the famous Princess Pat (Canadian) Regiment.

SEEK ARCHITECTURE PRIZE

Three Pennsylvania Students to Compete for French Scholarship Three architectural men of the University of Pennsylvania will compete in the finals for the Paris prize of the Beaux Arts Institute, according to an announcement just made by Dr. Warren P. Laird, head of the University architectural school. The three are F. A. Chapman, of San Francisco, class of 1917; F. H. Parves, of Chestnut Hill, who will be graduated in June, and J. K. Smith of Towanda, Pa., class of 1917. Work on the final problems will begin May 1 and last ten weeks. Announcement of the winner will be made July 13. The prize will be a two-and-one-half-year scholarship in the Beaux Arts Institute, with a yearly stipend of \$1200.



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
