

THE CRITIC TALKS TO MUSIC LOVERS

Weekly Comment on Things Musical in Discriminating Philadelphia

DR. THADDEUS RICH, concert. master of the Philadelphia Orches. tra, last Saturday evening came near giving an attack of heart failure to those "regulars" of the audience of the Philadelphia Orchestra who have been following the recent troubles of the Boston Symphony Orchestra. After the Cesar Franck symphony had been fin. ished and Mr. Stokowski had left the stage before the appearance of Katharine Goodson, the soloist, the audience was amazed to see the concertmaster calmly leave his place in the orchestra and walk off the stage.

No other member of the orchestra left his position and visions of a "ruction" similar to that which the Boston Orches. tra has just been experiencing passed wildly through the heads of those in the audience who are familiar with the troubles of that organization. However, troubles of that organization. However, the excitement was short-lived, for at the entrance to the stage Doctor Rich met Harry Wiegand, who does many things very well for the Philadelphia Orchestra other than take care of the music—no small job by the way—and arrange the scores for Mr. Stokowski when the conductor desires them. Mr. Wiegand explained to Mr. Rich that the intermission that evening came after the intermission that evening came after the concerto and not after the symphony, as concerto and not after the symphony, as the concertmaster thought and as in fact it usually does. Mr. Rich returned to the first violin desk amid applause and what promised to be a sensation met a speedy death. It was immediately apparent to the audience what had happened and more than one person thought it strange that Mr. Rich did not notice that none of the other musicians left their chairs. These
