

LEGION TO DRIVE FOR NEW MEMBERS

Campaign for 50,000 Will Be Launched April 17—Central Committee Named

TYLER ATTENDS MEETING

The American Legion county committee will launch a city-wide membership campaign in Philadelphia Saturday, April 17, for the purpose of enrolling 50,000 additional members. Thomas F. Meehan, of John J. Barry Post No. 83, as chairman of the membership drive committee, will direct the campaign. There will be a committee on membership in every district in Philadelphia.

There will be a central committee of seven members, one from each of the seven Legion districts as follows:

First district—Edward Hill, Jr., Post No. 2449 South Woodstock street; Post No. 405, 522 Walnut street; Third district—George W. Nofer, Post 88, 621 Belgrade street; Fourth district—T. Touque, Post 319, 3634 Glendon street; Fifth district—J. Frankford avenue; Sixth district—W. Willis Rommel, Post 3, care of B. H. Lister & Sons, Germantown; Seventh district—Thomas F. Meehan, Post 83, 902 Paragut Terrace.

At the meeting of the Yeomen (F) Post No. 50, to be held today at the New Century Club, George S. Stewart, Jr., will speak on "Americanization." Miss Alice M. Kelly will sing. Miss Mary McGuckin, accompanist. There will be other musical numbers by the jazz band of Post 277. Walter Hoban, the cartoonist, will be master of ceremonies.

George F. Tyler, commander of the

Department of Pennsylvania of the American Legion, left Friday for Washington to attend the five-day conference of leaders in the Legion movement called to meet there by National Commander Franklin D'Olier, of Philadelphia, to consider beneficial legislation that is being suggested to Congress.

With a few exceptions Pennsylvania posts have endorsed the program as recently outlined to the ways and means committee of Congress by National Commander D'Olier. This program suggests that Congress enact a four-way measure for the relief of the former service men. The first provision is for land opening and settlement; the second provides for aid in purchasing either urban or rural homes; the third for vocational training and the fourth provision calls for an adjustment of compensation. This latter is the so-called bonus matter.

LEGION WOMEN TO MEET


Ex-Yeomanettes to Hear D. S. Stewart and Jazz Band
