PRINCE FACES LONG WAIT

Slide in Culebra Cut of Panama Canal Holds Up Ships

Panama, March 25.—(By A. P.)—It is doubted here whether a channel sufficient to permit the passage of the British cruiser Renown can be cleared in the Culebra cut by Tuesday next when the Prince of Wales will arrive aboard the warship on his way to Australia.

More than twenty ships are still tied up as the result of the slide in the cut last Saturday. This afternoon an island fifty feet wide and three feet high is visible above the channel.

DAYLIGHT SAVING PLEA FAILS IN N. J.

Senate Committee Ignores Governor Edwards's Message Urging Passage of Act

TOLL BRIDGE BILL VETOED

Trenton, March 25.—Despite Governor Edwards's special message to the Senate urging action on the daylight saving bill which has passed the House, in view of confusion expected to result in northern New Jersey when the New York law goes into effect Sunday, no action had been taken by the upper house when it adjourned last night for the week.

Senate Majority Leader Allen, of Salem, who is chairman of the committee in charge of the bill, said the committee would not report the measure. The bill lacks four votes necessary to pass it and the chances for its

adoption are not good. Pressure may be brought on the Senate from northern New Jersey next week to put the bill through.

Governor Edwards yesterday vetoed Mr. Haggaman's measure appropriating \$615,085 for the purpose of acquiring toll bridges situated entirely within the state under the supervision of a commission of five persons to be appointed by the governor.

Among six bills approved by the governor was one appropriating \$100,000 for the construction of a building at the State College at New Brunswick, wherein a course in ceramics will be taught. The measure also appropriates \$12,000 annually for the operating expense of the building.

Another bill vetoed was that introduced by Senator White, of Atlantic, requiring affidavit of facts to be attached to the bill of sale of motor vehicles to prevent fraud in the sale of stolen cars.

STATE HEROES GET D. S. C.

Belated Awards to Pennsylvanians in List Approved by President Washington, March 25.—The names of Sergeant Joe Kaperzynski, of Brackridge, Pa., and Corporal Isial Kling, of 450 Manor street, Lancaster Pa., appear in a belated list of awards of Distinguished Service Crosses authorized by President Wilson.

The citations issued by the War Department follow: "Sergeant Joe Kaperzynski, Company A, Ninth Machine-Gun Battalion, for extraordinary heroism in action near Moulins, France, July 15, 1918, and near Madeline farm, October 16, 1918. During the German offensive July 15, 1918, Sergeant Kaperzynski, then a private, directed the firing of his machine gun while exposed to heavy enemy

artillery and machine-gun fire, inflicting heavy losses on the enemy. During the attack near Madeline he, with a companion, crawled in front of our lines and rescued a wounded American soldier.

During the attack all others of Corporal Kling's detail became casualties, but he continued on alone. Gaining an advanced position in a shell hole, he kept the enemy machine gun under continuous fire until reinforcements arrived and captured it."
