

NO SUFFRAGE AID FROM CONNECTICUT

Governor Refuses to Call Legislature Despite Action of G. O. P. Convention

DELEGATES ARE NAMED

Hartford, March 25.—Governor Marcus H. Holcomb, Republican, in a statement last night, flatly refused to call a special session of the Connecticut General Assembly to act on the proposed federal suffrage amendment.

Gov. Holcomb's statement follows: I have read the resolution passed today by the Republican state convention. I do not see how that changes the situation or assists to create the special emergency which authorizes the governor to call a special session.

"The state constitution places the responsibility upon the governor. I shall not shift it to the delegates to the Republican convention, and until it is changed by their vote I cannot call a special session."

New Haven, March 25.—With scarcely a dissenting voice, the Republican state convention adopted a resolution placing the party in Connecticut on record in favor of equal suffrage, and requesting Governor Holcomb to call a special session of the General Assembly to ratify the proposed federal amendment.

A preamble to the resolution expressed the belief of the committee that, as uncertainty exists as to ratification by one additional state in time to permit women to vote in the presidential election, a "special emergency" is created that would warrant the governor's calling the extra session.

CALL TETLOW INSANE

Heirs Contest Validity of Will Leaving All to Wife

Norristown, Pa., March 25.—After having asked a hypothetical question of about 1000 words, three eminent specialists on nervous diseases agreed that Henry Tetlow, founder of the Philadelphia toiler articles business which bears his name, was mentally unsound; suffered from senile dementia and did not have intelligent knowledge of his actions.

These children are cut off without a penny, the will bequeathing all of his estate, said to be worth about a half million dollars, to his second wife, Eliza Jarman Tetlow, to whom he was married in 1904, when he was sixty-five.

British Lord Says America May Follow Southern Republic in Peace Policy

ASKS FOR TRADE EQUALITY

London, March 25.—Domício de Gama, Brazilian ambassador to Great Britain, was the guest of honor last evening at a dinner given by merchants, bankers and industrial leaders connected with trade in Brazil.

About 200 persons attended, and Lord Balfour of Burleigh presided. Among the guests were Cecil Baring, a well-known banker; Viscount Deven-

port, Lord Farrington, Admiral Viscount Jellicoe and Lionel Rothchild and other British financiers. Members of the Brazilian embassy and many Brazilians resident in London sat down to the banquet board.

Lord Balfour and Senor da Gama delivered addresses. Lord Balfour said: "The United States has not ratified the peace treaty, and solid, serious opinion in the United States is doubtful about the future policies of the world. We may sympathize with her, but independent countries like Brazil may give the United States a lead in the matter."

One thing that Great Britain wanted, Lord Balfour continued, was trade with Brazil on the basis of equality. "We are not on a basis of tariff equality with the United States," he declared. "We want more than equality. There is room for trade for both the friendly nations with Brazil. Brazil is closely united to us by

ties of kinship and affection. We were the first to recognize Brazil's independence. She operated with the Allies in the recent world war, and we have defeated a military adventure which would have destroyed the liberties of the world."

"We owe no small debt of gratitude to the small independent countries like Brazil, which entered the war at a critical time, a time when the issue in her lot with the Allies greatly increased our ties of affection and friendship in the world. Do not forget that Brazil's step was taken at a critical time, a time when the issue in the world was not known."
