

HAVERFORD FORMS CLUB FOR HOOVER

Main Line Students Fall in Line With U. of P. Men—E. G. Hauff Is President

TO HOLD MASS-MEETING

Haverford College students have fallen in line with men of the University of Pennsylvania and formed a club with "Hoover for President" as their battle cry.

The undergraduates at both institutions plan to back up their moral support with active campaigning to seat the former food administrator in the highest office in the country.

The Haverford College Club, like that at the University, was formed on a strictly nonpartisan basis, the only thought being to support Hoover and "work like thunder for his election," as one member expressed it.

E. G. Hauff, of this city, was elected president at the organization meeting yesterday. E. D. Miner, of New York, was chosen as secretary and G. J. Leuba, Christopher Roberts and W. J. Brocklebank were selected as a committee to interest the faculty members in the project.

The club shortly will hold a mass-meeting on the campus to rally the supporters of Mr. Hoover. J. B. Jones, Raymond Ohi and A. W. Hastings have been placed in charge of this work.

Dr. Felix E. Schelling, head of the English department at Penn., has issued the following statement:

"As I am frequently asked this question, here are some of the reasons why Herbert Hoover is my choice for President of the United States:

"First, Mr. Hoover is not a politician—an inestimable advantage after the exhibition of the impracticability of politicians in the United States Senate to get us anywhere.

"Second, Mr. Hoover is not a lawyer, and, therefore, can look at a question without always determining it on the precedent of something which was done in the time of Washington or before.

"Third, Mr. Hoover is a tried man of modern affairs, honest, firm, adaptable, experienced, with the reputation of a great success in a difficult mission.

"Fourth, Mr. Hoover is a cosmopolitan, one who was lived, outside of the provinces and knows the ways of men more abreast with the modern world than most of our American legislators.

"Fifth, Mr. Hoover is a large American, not a petty American, a man of vision who recognizes obligations beyond those of his own state and parish.

"Sixth, Mr. Hoover is one who believes in a practicable League of Nations in which America shall perform her duties to the world and yet preserve the integrity of her own institutions."

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22 REQUESTS FOR HEARINGS

Commission to Take Up Proposed Constitution Draft Changes April 6

Harrisburg, March 25.—Twenty-two requests for hearings have been received by Dr. William Draper Lewis, secretary of the commission on constitutional revision and amendments. Dates for the hearings are now being scheduled by Dr. Lewis.

It is understood that the commission will take up proposed changes in the tentative draft of the constitution and new subjects at the opening of the hearings, Tuesday, April 6. The commission may resume its work immediately following the hearings, instead of adjourning until fall.

By this plan it is hoped to have the proposed new constitution completed by December. It will be presented to the Legislature when it convenes next January.

INSURANCE MEN ARRESTED

Six Solicitors and Agent Charged With Misrepresenting Policies

Six solicitors and an agent of the Pelican Mutual Life Insurance Co. were arrested yesterday by County Detective Cochrane, charged with selling health and accident insurance under the guise of life insurance. They are being held on charges of conspiracy to cheat and defraud.

The men were arrested following an investigation by John C. Arnold, district attorney of Clearfield county. The agent arrested gave his name as Morris Lohel, of Third and Poplar streets.

According to Mr. Arnold, the solicitors worked among the foreign born in Clearfield county and also in this city. In some instances, he said, policies were taken out for infants.

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POSITIVE HOOVER WOULD BE ELECTED

Men of All Parties in Boston Loudly Cheer Former Food Chief

LABOR PROBLEMS ARE AIRED

Boston, March 25.—The relationship of employer and employe, as considered by the national industrial conference of which he was a member, and the difference in the point of view of the conference and that of Kansas legislation for the judicial settlement of labor disputes, were discussed by Herbert Hoover in an address here yesterday.

Enthusiasm ran very high and Edward A. Filene, one of Boston's biggest dry goods merchants, who in Boston is credited with being the original Wilson man in this city, led the cheering, both before and after the dinner. Mr. Filene was willing to wager 2 to 1 that Mr. Hoover, if nominated by the Democrats, would be elected, while if nominated by the Republicans he would make the odds 5 to 1 on his election.

The audience which assembled at the Copley Plaza to hear Mr. Hoover was the largest which has ever attended such a function. It was composed of the substantial business men of Boston, regardless of political party, and the numbers were so large—1570—that it was

necessary to have Mr. Hoover speak twice in different dining halls. "The conference," he said, "has endeavored to find a plan for systematic organization of the forces that are making for better relationships, to encourage growing acceptance of collective bargaining by providing a method that should enable it to meet objections of its critics, and to aggregate around this the forces of conciliation and arbitration now in such wide use. It has sought to do this without legal repression but with the organized pressure of public opinion. To me there is no question that we should try the experiment of the perhaps longer road, proposed by the industrial conference, for development of mutual-

ity of relationship between employer and employe, rather than to enter upon summary action of court decision that may both stifle the delicate adjustment of industrial processes and cause serious conflict over human rights. "To me the upbuilding of the sense of responsibility and of intelligence in each individual unit in the United States, with the intervention of government only to promote the development of these relations, the suppression of domination by any one group over another, is the basis upon which democracy must progress. "I do not believe we can attain equality of opportunity or maintain initiative through crystallization of economic

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
