

AMERICAN LEGION TO AID FOREIGNERS

Naturalization to Be Made Easy for Aliens Who Served U. S. During War

In carrying out the program outlined by the Americanization committee of the American Legion in Pennsylvania, unassisted foreigners who have an honorable discharge from the army, navy or marine corps have been invited to present themselves to state headquarters, 841 Chestnut street, and have been taken to the Naturalization Court in order that they may become citizens on the expiration of their honorable discharge.

Such applicants will receive attention at the state headquarters of the American Legion on Fridays. This work is in charge of William J. Smyth, assistant adjutant.

In a bulletin forwarded from state headquarters all posts are urged to send telegrams or letters urging him in the strongest possible terms to persuade his committee to report on the bill embodying the fourfold optional plan for beneficial legislation advocated by the Legion. This plan includes a recommendation of adjusted compensation on the basis of \$1.50 for each day of service.

WOMEN'S LAND ARMY BEGINS SEASON 2 MONTHS EARLIER

Extraordinary Demand for Farmerettes Leads Chief to Conduct Survey of Colleges for Recruits

The Woman's Land Army will begin its third season at least two months earlier than last year and will start work April 6.

An extraordinary demand for woman labor on the farm has already come to the office of the committee at 1525 Locust street; and Miss Virginia M. McCormick, executive secretary, with Mrs. Louis B. Taylor, chairman of the recruiting committee, is conducting an active search among colleges of this state for recruits. According to Miss McCormick, the demand this year is greater than in either of the previous two years and the committee will be able to place as many recruits as can be found.

The women, realizing that they are in demand this year, have already raised their price to \$2.75 and \$3 a day for an eight-hour day, and where experienced farmerettes work along side men in heavy work, they will be paid men's wages.

The farmerettes will work in units, with a housekeeper and a supervisor for chaperonage and they demand shower-baths and telephones. The supervisor is a new institution whose function is keeping accounts and seeing to it that the farmerettes are employed every day.

Applications have been received from eighty girls, the majority of them in experienced, including a trained nurse, a physical culture teacher, several who graduated from college in February, an expert stenographer and a number who have worked in offices and factories during the winter and want outside jobs for summer.

Virtually all the old units have applied for woman labor and New Jersey is asking that a unit be established there.

BROKE GLASS TO HEAR BANG

Leading Boys to Smash 18 Windows

This was the explanation given by two ten-year-old boys arrested by district detectives of the Twenty-second street and Hunting Park avenue police station, for breaking eighteen windows in the Whittier School, Twenty-seventh and Clearfield streets, Friday.

The boys, who gave their names as Edward Kleist, Twenty-fifth and Silver streets, and Francis Hennley, Twenty-sixth and Steiner streets, are being held for one week in the House of Correction. Their parents were ordered to pay for the glass.

Edgar Kuhn, a dentist with offices at Sixteenth and Race streets, was sent on the plea of an employer, to the Philadelphia General Hospital today by Magistrate Carney instead of being prosecuted for the alleged theft of \$200 worth of dental instruments. The theft, according to Doctor Kuhn, came as the result of months of worry over raising money to care for the daughter who lives in Hartford and who has tuberculosis.
