

BOY, 3, IS DROWNED IN QUARRY POOL

Companion Tries to Aid Him With Stick—Had Been Throwing Stones

PATROLMAN RECOVERS BODY

In the presence of a six-year-old playmate, who made a vain effort to save him, three-year-old Charles Kriebel, 1804 Medary avenue, was drowned late yesterday afternoon in a quarry on the Wharton estate, near Chelton and Goetz avenues.

With Wallace Smith, who lives at 1802 Medary avenue, Charles wandered over to the quarry hole. The little fellow roamed about and took keen delight in discovering strange things along the stream which comes with the spirit of boyish adventure.

A pile of stones then caught their eye and they had a friendly contest in throwing them into the water. In attempting to throw in a particularly heavy piece of rock Charles lost his balance and fell headlong in the water. As his head appeared above the surface, Wallace reached out toward him with a stick, but it was beyond the reach of Charles, who sank as his hand was outstretched to his little companion.

Believing there might be a chance to still save his playmate, Wallace searched the neighborhood for aid. He then ran home and told his father, who informed Patrolman Ehresmann of the accident.

TO PRODUCE OLD PLAY

"Broker of Bogota," by Phila. Playwright, to Be Revived

"The Broker of Bogota," by Robert Montgomery Bird, one of Philadelphia's first playwrights, in which Edwin Forrest starred nearly a hundred years ago, will be produced in May by the Zoetrope Society of the University of Pennsylvania.

The student production will follow the stage production as used by Forrest himself, while costumes and scenery will also approximate the originals. The original manuscript of the play is preserved in the University Library and received its first publication in 1819 in a collection of American plays by Dean Quinn.

BIG CARGO OF COCOA

British Steamer Brings 63,883 Bags From South Africa

What is believed to be the largest cargo of cocoa ever brought to this port has arrived on the British steamer Benguela from West Africa. The shipment consists of no less than 63,883 bags of cocoa, of which all but 300 bags are for local accounts. The rest is for Canadian purchases.

The Benguela took on this cargo at several West African ports. The largest proportion, 38,507 bags, was taken on board at Accra, together with 900 bags of ginger. The second largest amount, 13,308 bags, were received at Fomeba. Of the remainder, 6242 bags were taken on at Salt Pond, and 5920 bags at Secoudee. In the vessel also were 3000 tons of manganese ore. The shipments are consigned to the Levind Shipping Co.

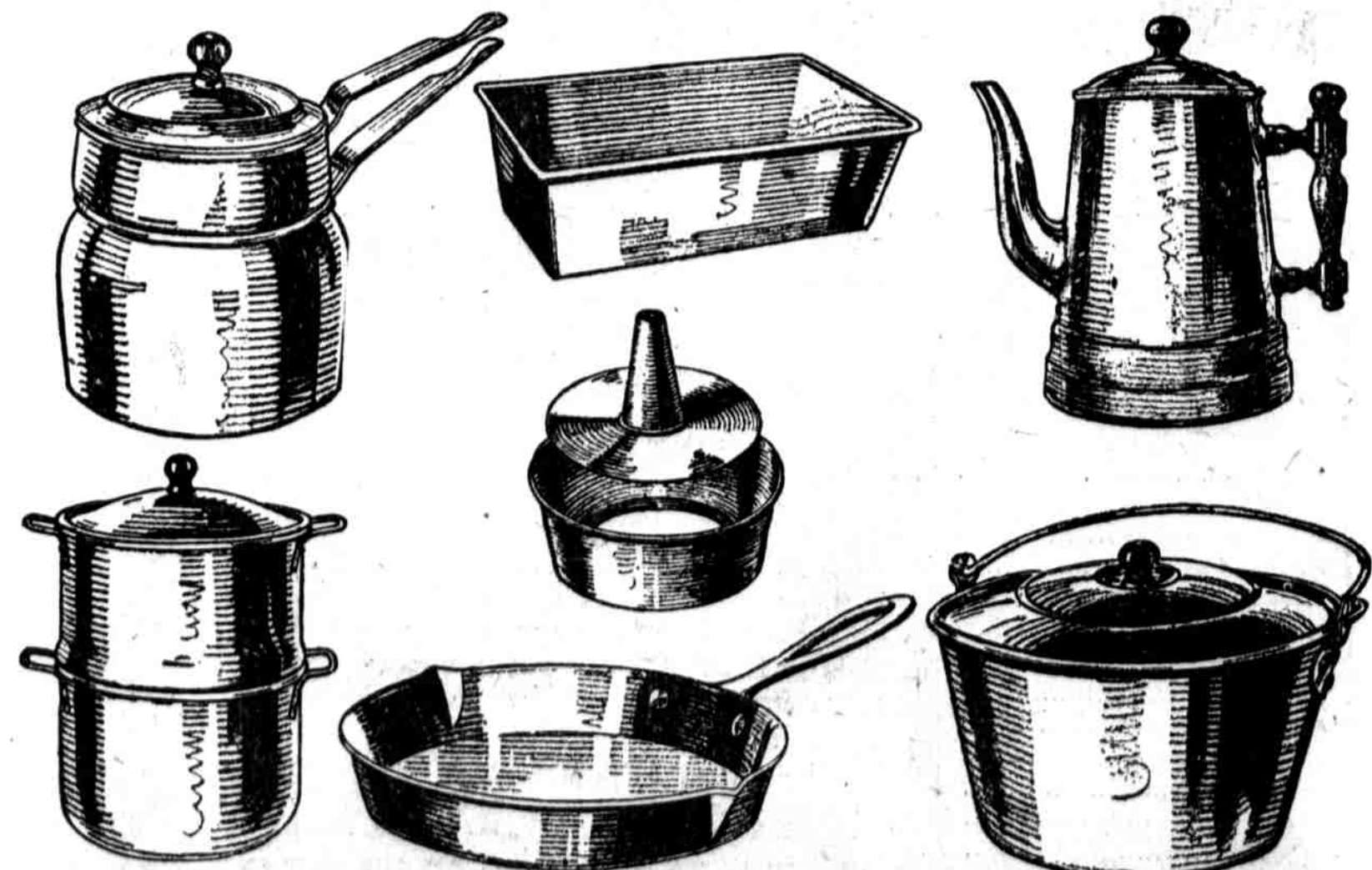
