

SEE SUCCESS FOR METHODIST DRIVE

Half of \$400,000 Fund for Hospital Will Be Obtained by Close of Year, Belief

ADDITION IS BADLY NEEDED

The campaign to raise the necessary funds for a \$400,000 addition to the Methodist Hospital, approved at the 25th annual meeting of the Philadelphia Methodist Episcopal Conference, is so well under way that leaders in the project declared today that the funds will be realized by the end of this year.

The need for the addition has become imperative to take care of the increased demands on the hospital that are expected to be started soon on the proposed structure and completed as the funds are secured for the purpose.

Although proposed some months ago, the Charles M. Boswell, corresponding secretary of the board of trustees of the hospital, said the project did not reach a final approval was given by the conference for a campaign to be waged among the churches and individuals for funds. It is hoped to finance the project principally through bequests and gifts.

In his annual report to the conference, Mr. Boswell showed how the hospital had reached its capacity almost daily and the need for more room to house its nurses and prevailing labor conditions had compelled the purchase of two houses on Broad street below Wolf. The nurses' training school has also reached its capacity and more room is needed for enlargement.

The campaign for funds is in the hands of its trustees, headed by Alex.

SAYS TEACHER PAY RISE NOT ENOUGH

Publicity-Chairman Asserts Only Small Percentage Get Over \$50 Yearly Increase

MANY VOICE PROTESTS

"Only a small percentage of public school teachers received an increase of over \$50 a year through a recent appropriation of the Board of Education to equalize the salaries of men and women teachers."

In discussing the salary question, Miss Katherine Andrews, chairman of the publicity committee of the Allied Teachers' Association, made this assertion today. Some teachers received no increase whatever under the new scale, she said, and others got an advance varying from thirty cents to \$2.80 a month. The public is under the impression that all teachers are going to get an increase under the recent revised schedule. But there are whole groups who will not receive an additional cent. Women teachers in special branches such as cooking, drawing, physical training and music and the men who have already reached their maximums, will get nothing. Naturally, those who receive nothing, while their fellow teachers do get an increase, resent it and regard it as a decrease to themselves.

Protests from teachers in schools in all sections of the city continue to pour into the headquarters of the teachers' organization and they all voice the hope that the Board of Education will take prompt measures to correct the inadequacies of the new schedule.

SEEK ACCIDENT INSPECTOR

Fourteen Take Tests for New Highway Bureau Position

The examination of fourteen applicants for the position of accident inspector, attached to the Bureau of Highways, was conducted yesterday by the Civil Service Bureau. The new position pays \$1500 and was created by Director Winston, of the Department of Public Works, with a view to preventing the city being mulcted for heavy damages through suits for accidents occurring on the highways.

The accident inspector will work in conjunction with Joseph K. Costello, chief of the Bureau of Claims of the Law Department. Whenever an accident is reported by the police the new inspector will go to the scene and ascertain if the city was in any way at fault.

The idea of the position was conceived by Director Winston and approved by Mayor Moore. No provision has been made in the annual budget for the pay of the new inspector and his salary will be paid from the general inspection item.

HOSPITAL SEEKS \$500,000

Dinner in Adelphi Opens Campaign to Aid the St. Agnes Hospital April 6, a dinner was given in the Hotel Adelphi last night, when the drive organization was completed.

Judge John M. Patterson, chairman of the campaign committee, presided. A business men's division, consisting of thirty members of six members each, was formed; also a women's division of ten teams of ten members each, under direction of Mrs. George Mueller. There will be also a junior auxiliary, whose members will man booths and solicit in theatres, motion-picture houses and hotels, and a parish organization.
