EIGHT-ROUND BOUTS IN CAMDEN TONIGHT

Four Contests Between Bantams, Lightweights, Welterweights and Heavyweights Included on Inaugural Program at Taylor's Sportsmen's Club

PHILADELPHIA and the city of Camden are to be brought closer together, beginning tonight, and in the future sportsmen from both sides of the river will rub elbows, as they say, at least once every three weeks, and sometimes every fortnight. The magnet for the bringing together of fans from these cities will be boxing bouts—matches of stellar variety, which are to be put on at the Third Regiment Armory, Madison avenue and Mickle street, Camden, N. J.

The armory, on boxing nights, will be located the Camden Sportsmen's Club, and it is bound to rival that of the regular headquarters in Jersey City and Newark, where boxing is flourishing. It took Herbert Taylor, who permits his friends to call him Mugsy, more than a year to start boxing in Camden and now that he has the sanction of the New Jersey State Boxing Commission, "Mugs" will not let the thing develop, or rather thrive into a fizzle.

Only top-notch boxers, a champion in every show, are to be put on, said Taylor, who is president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, manager and bookmaker of the Camden Sportsmen's Club, today, as he started for the big little burg across the Delaware. "That's the way to be my motto, so how can the going mis, it's got to go, and it will."

As a criterion of the sort of programs Manager Taylor expects to get together, the following card is given for his opening show:

TWO MORE LOCAL YOUTHS LINE UP WITH JERSEY CITY

Bill Magee, Catcher, and Eberts, Infielder, to Join Other Philadelphians With Bill Donovan's Club

Two more Philadelphia youths have forwarded signed contracts to the office of the Jersey City baseball club. By the time the 1920 International League season opens this team will have all the aspects of a Quaker City nine. The latest men to sign up with Wild Bill Donovan, who also is a Philadelphia, are William H. Magee, 2660 North Twenty-seventh street, and John Eberts, 2739 North Twenty-ninth street.

Eberts has been playing on the sand lots in this city for six years. He is an infielder and will endeavor to win a berth with the Skeeters at the shortstop station. This boy is 20 years of age, weighs 150 pounds, stands 5 feet 10 inches, and throws and bats right handed.

Last year Ebert signed a contract with the Athletics, after playing through the season of 1919 with the Woodlark club, of which he also was manager. Early last season Eberts played shortstop with the Edward G. Budd team.

Magee also is a 20-year-old. He, too, throws and bats right handed, while his position is behind the plate. In 1919 Magee, who weighs 185 pounds, was one of the star catchers of the Southampton, Montgomery County League, and also played with the E. G. Budd nine.

Both Magee and Eberts will report to Manager Donovan tomorrow. Other Philadelphians already under contract with the Skeeters are Jimmy Haffey, infielder; Spike Danley, pitcher, and Johnny Lockney, trainer.

JOHNSON STILL IN MEXICO Negro Heavyweight Arranging for Matches and Exhibitions

Calxico, March 31.—Jack Johnson, former heavyweight champion, arrived at Mexicali, adjoining Calxico, but across the international line in Mexico, yesterday. Johnson was accompanied by his wife, his nephew and his wife's maid. He came from Mexico City, and was carrying a passport purporting to have been issued by the United States Embassy at Mexico City. Johnson began negotiations today for a fight at Mexicali in the near future. He also signed an agreement to give an exhibition boxing match at Mexicali next Sunday. Johnson said he expected to return to the United States and "get squared" with the federal authorities soon. He said he would then take up his former occupation of boxing and would sign for a theatrical tour.

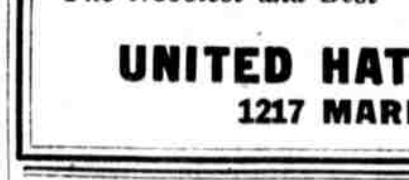

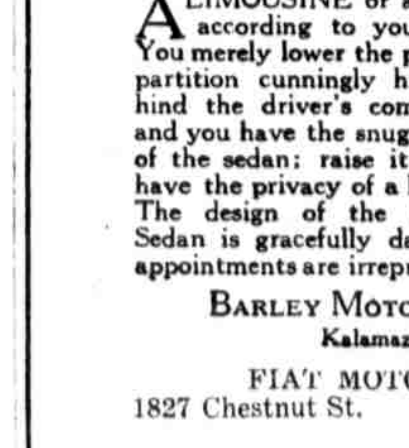
NEW SKEETER PLAYERS William Magee (top) is a catcher and Eberts is an infielder

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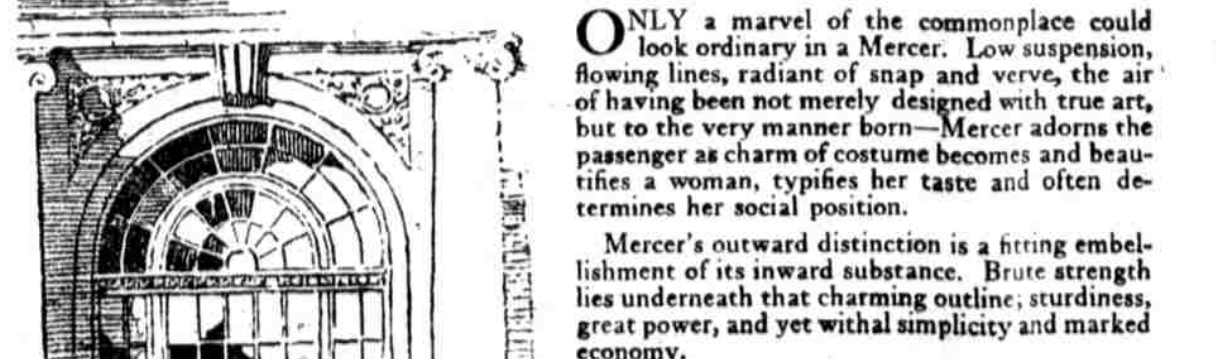
