

FORECAST SUCCESS FOR CHURCH FUND

Asserts Episcopians Will Raise \$650,000 in Pennsylvania During 1920

60 PER CENT TAKE PART

The Pennsylvania division of the nation-wide drive of the Episcopal Church to obtain funds will be a success, it is forecasted.

Reynolds D. Brown, executive secretary of the drive in this state, believes that \$650,000 is a "reasonable estimate" of the 1920 results in Pennsylvania.

Bishop Garland and several prominent clergymen joined with Mr. Brown in predicting complete success for the drive. Their optimism is regarded at the Church House as sufficient answer to the Rev. David M. Steele, rector of the Church of St. Luke and the Glee Club, who a few days ago referred to the plan as a "wild project" and a "failure."

Mr. Brown's report, which is published in the Church News, shows that approximately 60 per cent of the 190 parishes and missions in the diocese took part in the campaign.

Grand Army veterans in this city and throughout the country are celebrating today the day which meant as much to them as the Fourth of July. Probably the number of survivors of those who entered the South's capital

Grant had been anticipating day after day for a year.

The fall of Richmond was the sequel to the piercing of the defenses of Petersburg, twenty-two miles south, where for nearly ten months General Lee had stubbornly held the key to the capital. The fatal break in the Confederate lines was the result which
