

**SWISS TO AID WORLD STRIKE**  
Medical Elements Planning to Test Solidarity of Proletariat  
Geneva, April 2.—(By A. P.)—Preparations for a world-wide twenty-hour strike on May 1 are being made in Switzerland by Socialists, Communists and other radical elements. Foreign agitators are active in the movement, but they will probably be expelled before that date.  
It is virtually certain, however, the Swiss will join in the movement, which was launched by Nikolai Lenin, premier of Russia, as an experiment to test the solidarity of the world proletariat.

**WAR DECLARED ON BEAVER**  
Tiny Little Animal Held Responsible for Damaging Floods  
Albany, N. Y., April 2.—(By A. P.)—Game protectors and forest rangers were sent orders today by the conservation commissioner to wage a relentless war on the beaver.  
They were instructed to take the initiative in tearing out beaver dams and destroying beaver houses, where extensive damage is being caused by the flooding of property because of the dams which the animals have built.

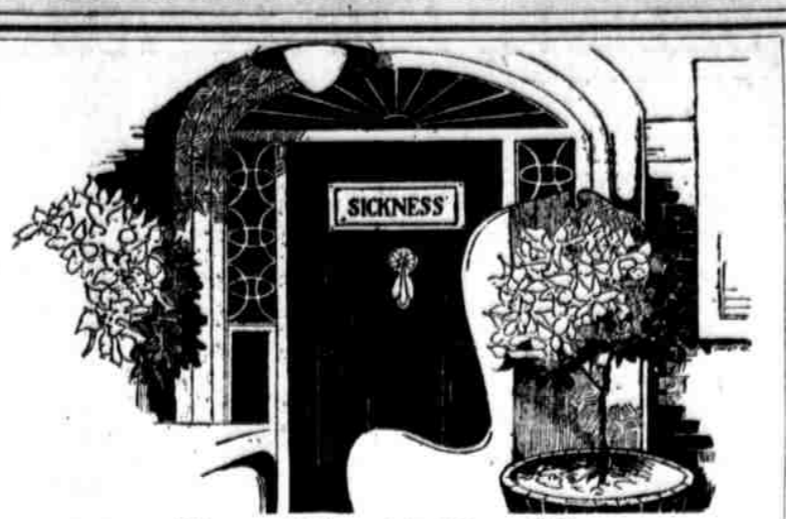
**N. Y. FOOD SUPPLY HIT**  
Strike of 6,000 Ties Up 80 Per Cent of Railroad Lighters  
New York, April 2.—(By A. P.)—All but 20 per cent of the railroad owned tugs and steam lighters which railroad representatives assert bring to New York 90 per cent of its food supplies are tied up as a result of the marine workers' strike. J. J. Mantel, railroad managers' representative, announced today.  
The railroad-owned ferries on the Hudson river, the crews of which were also called out, are apparently not seriously affected, Mr. Mantel stating that all but one line are running on regular schedule. Reduced travel today, due to the Good Friday holiday, has enabled the railroads to use ferries to a large extent in the transportation of food and milk which otherwise would have been carried by the steam lighters and railroad car floats.

**"COUGH UP OR WALK UP"**  
New York, April 2.—(By A. P.)—A slogan of "cough up or walk up" was adopted last night at a meeting of unionized elevator operators and stairmen, at which plans were formulated for demands of higher wages and better working hours, to be introduced at a mass-meeting next Monday night. A committee was appointed to confer with the real estate operators in an effort to avert a strike, which would affect 15,000 members of the union employed in office buildings, loft buildings and apartment houses.

**WILKES-BARRE HAS 73,828**  
Census Shows 10 Per Cent Increase in Population in Last Ten Years  
Washington, April 2.—(By A. P.)—Population statistics announced today by the Census Bureau included: Wilkes-Barre, Pa., 73,828, an increase of 6723 or 10 per cent over 1910. Waterloo, Ia., 30,230; Murphysboro, Ill., 10,411; Long Branch, N. J., 13,521.

**Winter Undermined Tank**  
Woodbury, N. J., April 2.—Frost leaving the ground under a large water tank on the farm of John P. Day caused the foundation to lower and the tank and framework fell, demolishing the outfit. The tank fell on Day's milk house, crushing it, as there were 2000 gallons of water in it.

**COMBINED BUREAUS SOUGHT**  
House Bill Provides Single Head for All War-Benefit Boards  
Washington, April 2.—A bureau of war benefits embracing the Bureau of War-Risk Insurance and the Public Health Service of the Treasury Department, the Federal Board for Vocational Education and the Bureau of Pensions of the Interior Department, would be created under a bill introduced by Representative Clifford Ireland, Republican of Illinois.  
The secretary of the interior and the director and assistant directors of the bureau would constitute a committee to co-ordinate, systematize and reorganize the various divisions of the bureau and make quarterly reports to Congress as to cases adjusted or pending.
