

INVITE EDWARDS, METHODIST URGES

Ocean Grove Director Takes Issue With Dr. Marshall's Exclusion Plan

Frederick, April 2.—Announcement by the Rev. William Marshall, D. D., acting president of the Ocean Grove Camp Meeting Association, that Governor Edwards would not be invited to be the orator of the day in the big auditorium on July 4, has stirred up a lot of trouble among the directors of the association. It has been the time-honored custom of the association to select each incoming governor of New Jersey as the Fourth of July orator during the first year of his administration. The declaration by Doctor Marshall that this practice would not be followed in the case of Governor Edwards was based upon the governor's outspoken opposition to prohibition. The governor's views on this subject are distinctly at variance with those of the Methodist Episcopal Church and, therefore, it was not entirely a surprise when Doc-

tor Marshall announced that Governor Edwards would not be invited. W. Holt Apper, of this city, a member of the board of directors of the camp-meeting association, said yesterday he was in favor of keeping up the old custom of having the new governor deliver the address at the auditorium. He expressed the belief that a majority of the members of the board concur with him in this view. Although he has not attended a meeting of the board since Governor Edwards was inaugurated in January, Mr. Apper said he had carefully examined the minutes without discovering that any action had been taken to exclude the governor from the auditorium. As viewed by Mr. Apper Doctor Marshall was merely giving expression to his own personal views respecting the propriety of inviting Governor Edwards and was not speaking authoritatively for the board of directors. Admitting that Doctor Marshall was perfectly free to express his own opinion on the subject, Mr. Apper feels equally confident that he had no authority to speak in be-

half of the directorate. As Mr. Apper understands the situation, the rules of the association provide that the incoming governor shall be invited to speak in the auditorium during the first year of his term, and hence affirmative action by the board would be necessary to prevent him from receiving such an invitation. In the absence of such action Mr. Apper believes the invitation to the governor would be extended automatically. It is probable that the entire subject will be discussed by the board of directors at a meeting scheduled to be held at Ocean Grove April 10.

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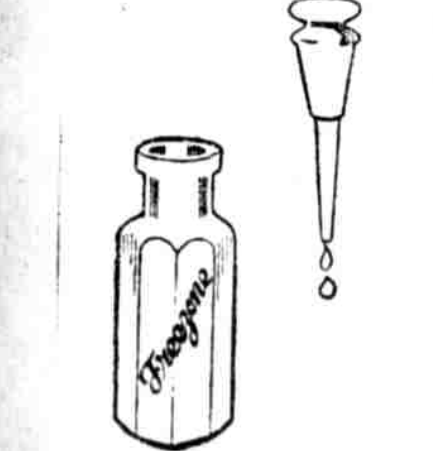
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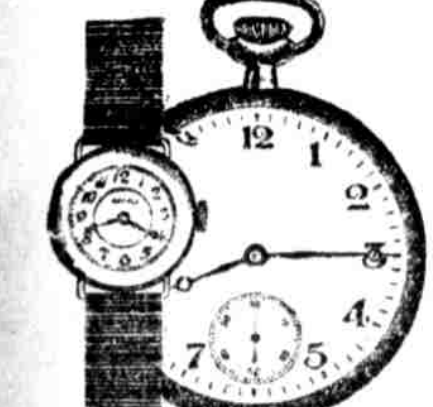
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
