



Trenton. It is estimated that the state is losing \$25,000 a day in fees, which will be only partially made up later. This situation is the result of the at-tempt of the Republican majority in the Legislature to wrest from the Demo-crats the office of motor vehicle com-missioner. This office, up until mid-night last night, was occupied by Wil-liam L. Dill, of Paterson. The law, which is now sought to be changed, made the assistant secretary of state the motor vehicle commissioner. 


