

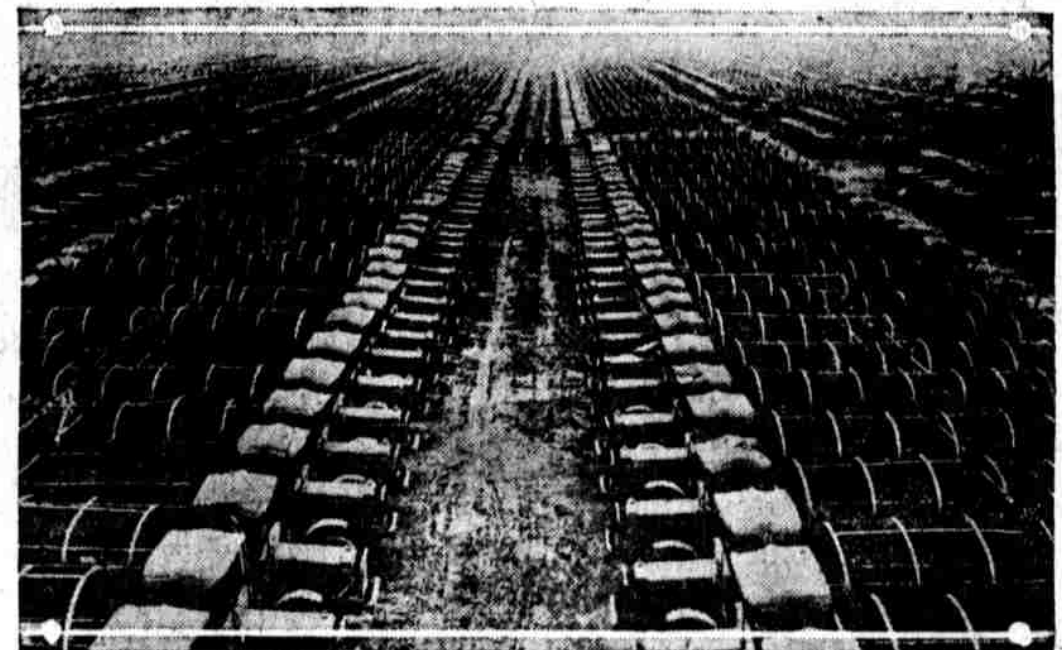
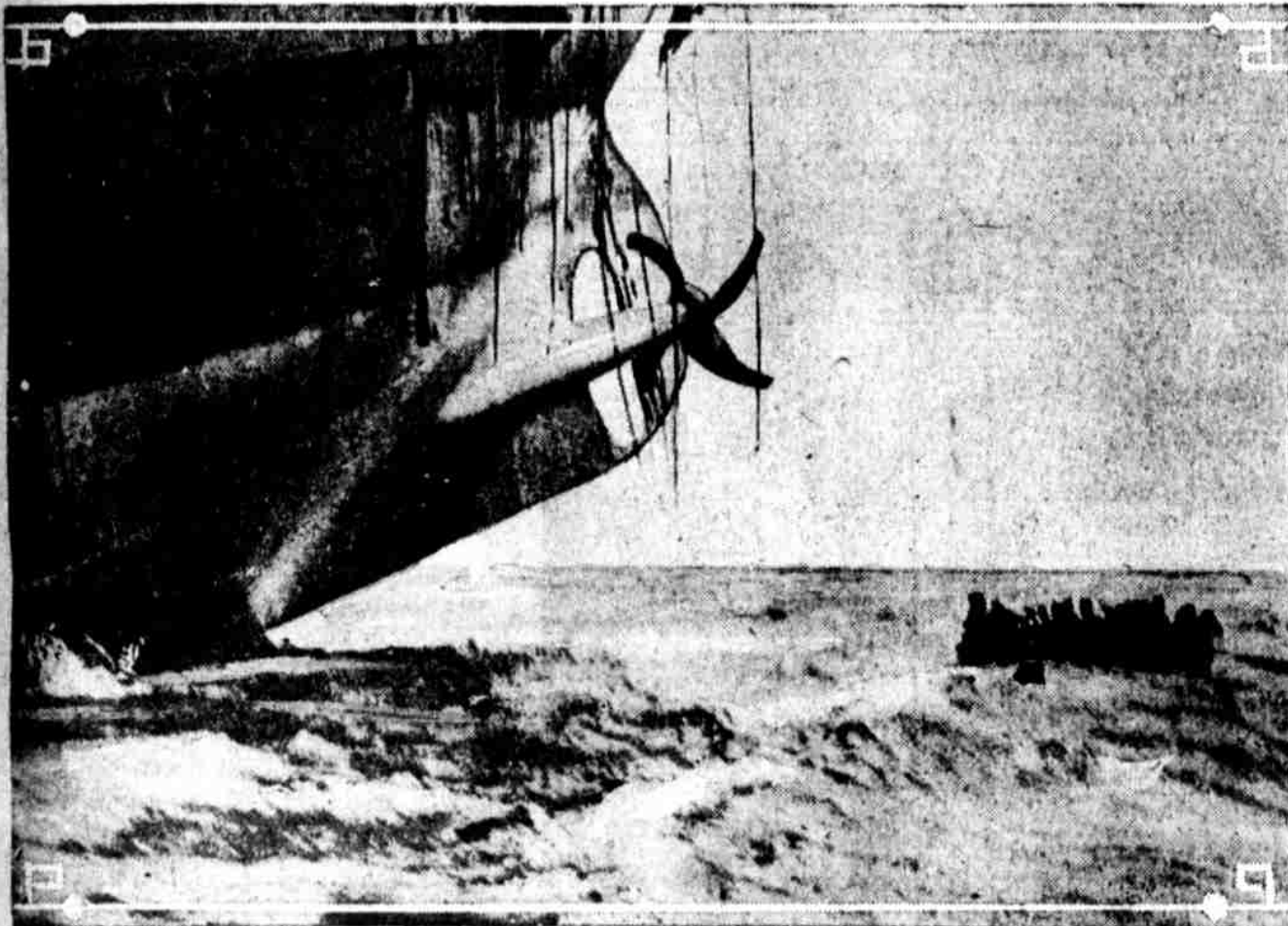
"Boccaccio" to be Given for Charity: "Nat" Hurd in Wonderful Jump: "Snow Baby" as Sponsor

"NAT" HURD, the widely known sportsman, going over the barriers in a wonderful jump with his mount "George," at Pinehurst, N. C.



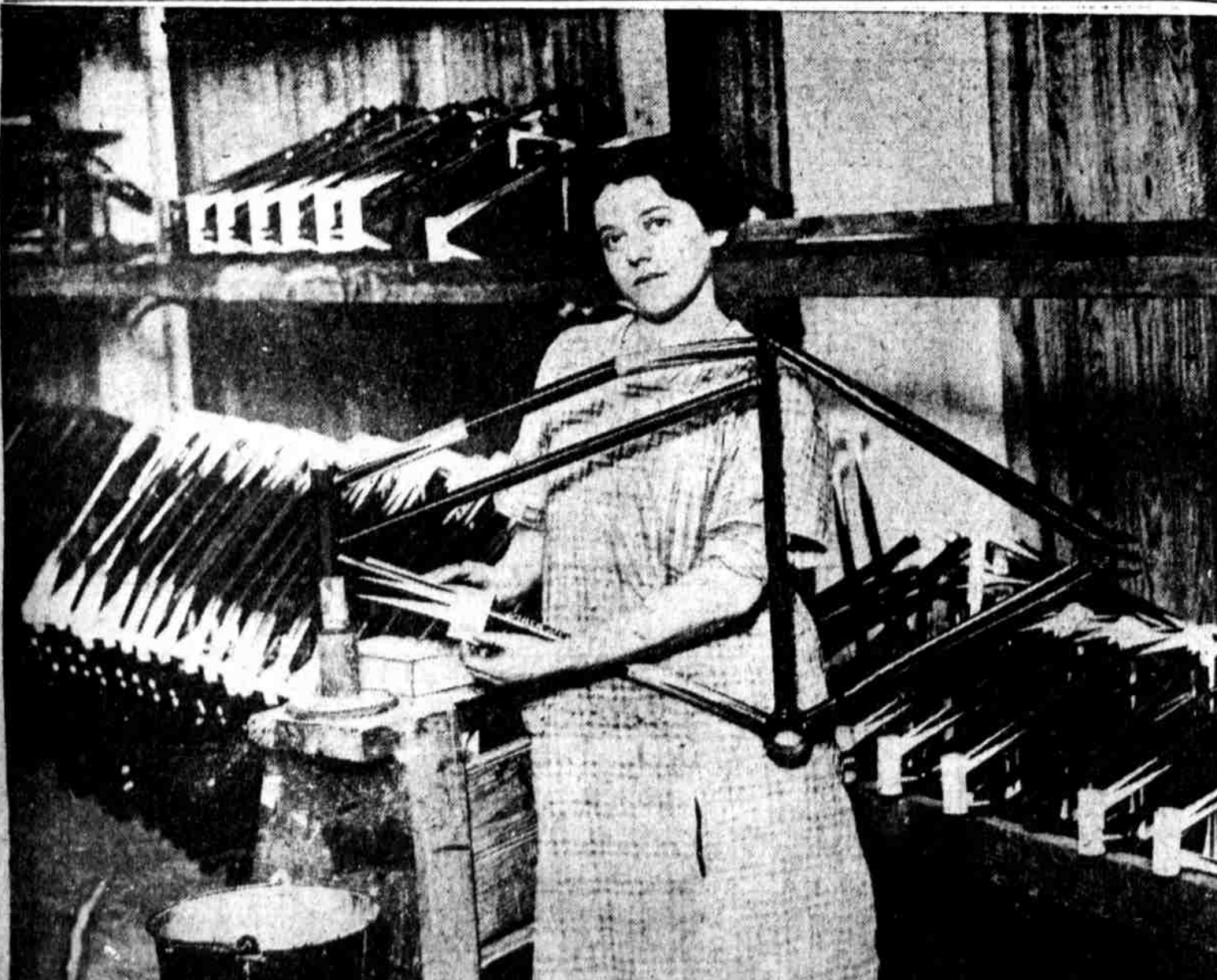
