"I have nothing but sympathy to express for the unfortunate lady," Mr. Noyes said at Princeton. "Evidently she has been brooding over the execution of her brother for treason against the British Government.

"I can quite understand that a lady whose brother was executed for treason would be somewhat upset. I am sincetely sorry for her. Hers is a tragic case."


